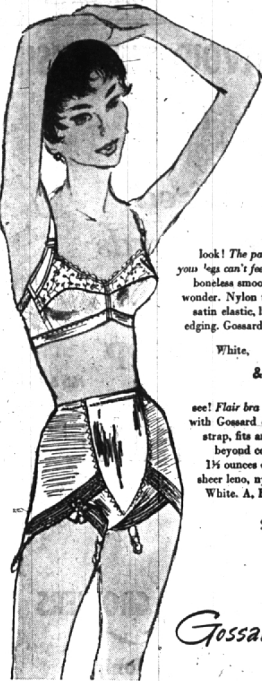

10-Day Tour of State To Follow Convention

Following the annual convention of the National Editorial association in Detroit next July, editors from all parts of the United States will make a 1,700 mile tour of Michigan over a period of ten days. Arrangements for the tour were made Friday at a meeting of a special committee of the national association at Kellogg Center, East Lansing.

The convention is scheduled for July 9-12, 1958 and the tour will be from July 13-24, inclusive. Clare Hewens, publisher of the Huron Daily Tribune, Bad Axe, is chairman of the committee in charge of arrangements for both the convention and tour. He said at least 150 visiting editors and publishers will make the tour getting a first-hand look at Michigan's industrial, recreational and educational resources.

THE NATIONAL convention is expected to attract 700 persons. Working on the arrangements committee with Mr. Hewens are: Berkeley Smith, East Tawas; James Tagg, Farmington; Elmer White, Michigan Press Association, East Lansing; George R. Averell, Birmingham; Rep. Sterling Eaton, Plymouth; George Osborn, Sault Ste. Marie, and Frank Russell, Jr., Marquette.

Mr. Hewens said the tour will be of great importance to Michigan because the association represents between five and six thousand newspapers and the trip will result in publication of stories and pictures about the state in newspapers all across the nation.

State agencies will cooperate with the tour committee, including the Michigan Tourist council, Michigan State Highway department, Michigan Department of Conservation and the Michigan Economic Development department.

MR. HEWENS SAID he appointed Don Weeks, director of the economic development department, to coordinate plans for Michigan publicity in connection with the tour. The tour will start at Detroit at the close of the convention. Traveling in chartered busses the editors and publishers will travel through 44 of the state's 83 counties and will get a broad view of the expanse of Michigan's two pen-

insulas. From Detroit the group will travel to Monroe and then go north through Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor then on to Lansing. From the state capital the route swings in a south-westerly direction to Battle Creek and Kalamazoo.

The party will travel north to Grand Rapids, Muskegon, Ludington, Manistee and Traverse City, staying two nights in Leelanau county.

THE TOUR WILL GO through Charlevoix and Petoskey to Mackinac Island, after a visit to Mackinac Island which will proceed to St. Ignace and Sault Ste. Marie.
