The Bloomfield Hills School District No. 2 employed 90 contractual personnel for the school year 1956-57.

The minimum salary paid a beginning teacher was \$4,200.00, and ranged upward to \$6,800.00 for teachers with a master's degree, after 12 years of experience.

At the close of school year 1956, there were 1,939 students enrolled in the school district—1,137 were elementary students, and 802 were secondary students in grades 7 through 12.

The ratio of pupils to teacher, in elementary and secondary grades, average about 22.

The Bloomfield Hills School District's valuation is \$61,000,000. The census count shows 2663 pupils in the 5 to 19 year group. The public school enrollment is 2428. The present total millage rate for school purpose is 18.61 mills; one of the lower millage rates in the area.

The Bloomfield Hills School District is composed of four elementary and one Junior-Senior High School. The five buildings and the equipment are insured under a policy of full coverage. All buildings are carefully maintained and are checked frequently for fire hazards, boiler conditions, proper exits and other factors in keeping with proper safety.

In view of the rapid growth of the school district it is recommended that we re-study our long range planning to determine the extent of acceleration needed in our building program. It is also recommended that we acquire additional sites and that we hasten the completion of our new Junior High School, and the new elementary school.

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BLOOMFIELD, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the Township of Bloomfield, Oakland County, Michigan, on Tuesday, the 8th day of October, 1957, from 7:00 o'clock A.M. to 8:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, to vote upon the following proposition:

That the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in the Township of Bloomfield, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1952, be increased, as provided in Article X, Section 21, of the Constitution of the State of Michigan, by 1/100th of 1% (\$1.00 per \$1000) of the assessed valuation as equalized, of all the property in the Township of Bloomfield, for a period of twenty (20) years from 1958 to 1977, both inclusive, for the purpose of paying the township's share, or any part thereof, of the capital costs of acquiring, improving, enlarging, and/or extending facilities for the collection, transportation, and/or treatment of storm water and/or sanitary sewage from the township, or from the township and one or more other political subdivisions, and/or for the purpose of paying principal and interest on any bonds which may be issued to pay any such costs, with power to the Township Board to irrevocably allocate said tax limitation increase to one or more such projects?
