This summer the carillonneur was 12-year-old Bob Aten. Bob is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Aten of Quartion road. Just before school was out this year, Bob, who is a pupil of Dr. Maurice Garabrant, organist at Christ Church, tried the bells for the first time.

When Bob Paulette, the regular carillonneur, left for the summer Dr. Garabrant decided his pupil was doing well enough to play the carillon before the Sunday morning service. Bob played five hymns each Sunday.

A HIGH SPOT in his musical career occurred this summer when he played the carillon for Melinda Booth's wedding on Aug. 17 at the request of Melinda's father, Henry Booth. Bob has always been musical.

When he was four he played drums to his dad's accompaniment in the piano. His formal musical education began at the age of six when he studied piano for two years with Celia Ferrer.

BOB HAS BEEN studying with Dr. Garabrant for the past four years. In April the family purchased a Baldwin organ and Bob divided his time between the piano and organ, taking lessons on both. Bob seems to be a sort of one-man band. He played the trombone in the fifth and sixth grades and is now playing in the Bloomfield Hills high school band.

He also sang in the school choir and was a member of the barber shop quartet in the music festival last spring. He purchased a guitar with his own money and his big ambition is to own a mouth organ and a set of drums.

THE TROMBONE he plays has an interesting background. It is the one which Aten played with the Michigan State band when he was a student there.

In spite of all this music, Bob still finds time for football, baseball, hockey, fishing and boy scouts. You might say he is an athlete with a talent for music.
