PTA Council Schedules Training School

A PTA council leader-ship training school will be conducted at Birmingham high school for six consecutive weeks, beginning April 17, according to Mrs. Joseph H. Shaffer, president of the Birmingham PTA council.

It will provide an opportunity for new officers of local PTA units to become acquainted with parent-teacher work. Subjects to be covered are local units, parliamentary procedure, duties of officers, local programs, council-community relations and school administration. The course was planned and is under the direction of Dr. Ray Smith, professor of educational administration at Wayne state university.

During a year spent in Japan as a member of a U. S. educational mission, Dr. Smith held a number of PTA work shops and discovered that 95 per cent of Japanese schools have PTA association, with 37 million members as compared with 11 million in this country.

Mrs. Stewart Schweizer, past president of Detroit PTA Council and member of the board of managers of the Michigan congress of parent-teachers, will be the teacher-in-charge. Dr. Lynn Nicholas, professor of educational administration at Wayne U. will also teach a portion of the course.
