To Install Flash Units Displays At School Intersections Represent 30 Nations

WALNUT LAKE—Two Porta-Flash units will be installed soon at the Walnut Lake-Inkster road intersection and one west of the school on Walnut Lake road.

This action resulted through the efforts of the safety committee of Walnut Lake school, Deputy Bond to Ed Kraft of the Oakland County Sheriff's office and safety officer Stephen Navarre.

Alfred Thayer, supervisor of West Bloomfield township, agreed to have yellow lines painted at the intersection.

Safety patrol boys have previously been the only protection to some 500 children crossing Walnut Lake road and 50 children crossing Inkster road four times daily.

Further plans call for a traffic check by R. W. Osmond, traffic engineer with the Oakland county road commission. Parents will contribute to the safety program by using the turn around on the school property instead of double parking in front of the school.

Merchants in the shopping center directly across from the school will be asked to temporarily close their doors with an entrance and exit to prevent customers from backing up Walnut Lake road.

Walnut Lake Women's club and Braes number three association have agreed to purchase a Porta-Flash unit.

The safety committee, headed by Mrs. Gordon H. Foote, hopes to establish an annual safety award for the most outstanding safety patrol boy at Walnut Lake school.
