Missionaries To Be Guests Here Sunday

Dr. and Mrs. Warren Winkler, who will soon begin work in Turkey, will be guests of the Congregational church of Birmingham at next Sunday's morning worship services.

Guest speaker will be Miss Ethel Lovatt, co-leader from the same church in the same mission field. Miss Lovatt has been a nurse in Turkey under the American Board of Missions.

A missionary nurse since before World War II, Miss Lovatt went to the Near East in 1951, and studied language at Istanbul for a year. She then became director of nursing service and practical nurse training in a Turkish hospital.

The Winklers leave Sept. 26 for Turkey. Before that they will have completed an eight-week intensive study of Turkish at Harvard, and become parents of their first child, expected about June 15.

THEY WILL BE stationed first at Jemur, Turkey, to continue language study and be oriented to the Moslem and Turkish cultures. In April, 1959, they expect to move on to Tala, where they will replace a retiring missionary couple.

The outpatient clinic Dr. Winkler will head provides the only medical care available for a village of 3,000 and its surrounding villages.

Dr. Winkler states his wife, Mary Lou, "will probably contribute some teaching in the school." The young couple were married in 1955, while Dr. Winkler was a University of Michigan medical student. From 1954 to 1955 Dr. Winkler was director and his wife co-director of student activities for the Evangelical and Reformed church at E. of M.

Until recently, he practiced general medicine in Argo, Ill. The young jazz and ski enthusiast is a native of St. Louis, Mo.

His Cleveland-born wife taught in Michigan and Illinois elementary schools for six years.

Summing up their mission in Turkey, Dr. Winkler states, "Our government's technical and other assistance at times exports good will. However, the missionary with his longer stay, lower standard of living, and knowledge of the people, has a better chance to convey the meaning of Christianity and western civilization. They are not always the same, but are identified together."
