It shows that a streamlining of the county's governmental process is being achieved. As a result of consolidations, there now are fewer government units operating locally than five vener ago, This reduction is 35 percent.

These facts are found in a special study, covering every. United States county, made to the bureau as must of its 1957 consists of governments. It is the first such survey in five years.

IT SHOWS COMMUNITY AFFAIRS throughout the country are only partly it the hands of county and city government. In most places they are conducted, in addition, through various "district" bodies, which have authority over schools, high-ways, housing or over community fun-

THE REDUCTION WAS GREATER

THE REDUCTION WAS GREATER than that reported for most other U.S. counties, which had an average drop of 12 percent. In the East North Central States it was 17 percent.

Such consolidations have taken place in many areas in the United States, but have been offset partially by an increase in the number of special districts. The net result is 102,028 units of government throughout the country, nearly half of them school districts.

In Oakland, the decline in the number of school districts was from 86 to 32.
