Judy Tells of Visit To Dachau, A German Concentration Camp

This week we bring you more news of travels in Europe in a letter from Judy LaMeasure of Dorchester—a young Birmingham girl who swapped homes and families for a year in Germany.

"Our second and third day were spent in sight-seeing through Germany. We also drove to Dachau and this was the worst part of our whole trip. Dachau is the place where the German concentration camp was. You can never realize what horrible things really did happen unless you could see something like that.

We saw the incinerators where men were burned alive, firing ranges, gallows, blood ditches, cast iron safes for the disinfection of bodies hooked up on racks, gas chambers and all that was beyond description.

I WAS GLAD to leave, but glad to have realized what does go on when countries are at war. Soon we ran into some wild snow which made the autobahn we were traveling slippery and slow but we soon came to the border thru mountains very high.

The full moon and the new snow on them glinted like jewels and I was so excited, I had to let the driver. The lights of the small towns up in the mountains scattered over made it just like a dream to me.

COMING INTO Salzburg, we could see the castle on the hill all got closer the whole town was on hills with the mountains in the background, sort of encircling it and keeping it warm.

The next day we did some souvenir hunting and also saw the birthplace of Mozart. Next to Paris, Salzburg was fabulous. After leaving the city we crossed the border into the southern up of Germany and had some trouble with our residence papers and after talking our way round it we crossed it.

WE TOOK a 25 minute ride in a basket up a huge mountain looking down on people skiing down the snow covered slopes—it was great.

Doubling back, we crossed into Austria and when we arrived in Innsbruck it was rather late. But we were wide awake and since Italy was so close, maybe 50 miles through the mountains, we started toward it.

WE DROVE through the famed Brenner Pass where Hitler and Mussolini shook hands over their truce and across the border.

Even though it was late when we crossed, we could compare things—these towns were or appeared much poorer and there was a real difference in architecture once we got farther south.

We passed not one car nor more than three people the whole seven hours we drove, so we had it all to ourselves.

The next day we rested up for a while and then headed towards the next town. After spending an hour or so there we drove into Switzerland. We drove around Lake Constance and then to the city of Constance in Germany.

WE RESISTED the temptation to drive down to Milan and headed back into Austria for the third time. Before we got to the border we were both so tired we had to stop. We slept in the cold car for four hours.

Mrs. E. L. Robinson made the arrangements with Mrs. Elton Reynolds and Mrs. Alan Nichols assisting.

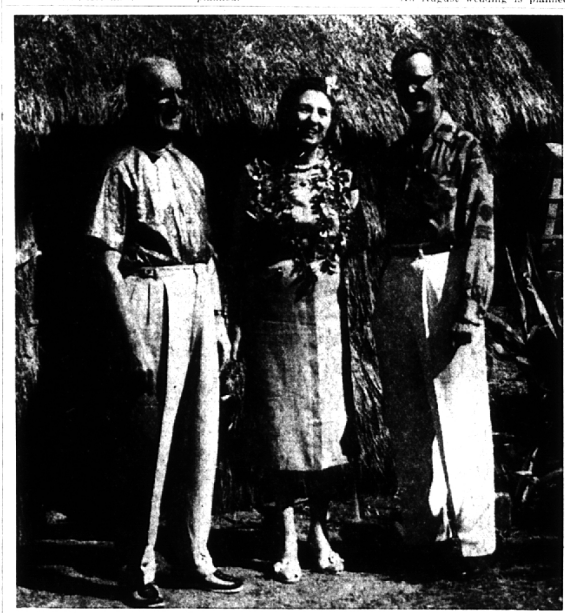
A study of Birmingham library facilities was passed as the local study item for the next year. On the state level the League is already working for a favorable vote in November on the question of calling a state constitutional convention.
