

Franklin to Try To Organize Its Council Meetings

FRANKLIN—Full of high purpose and resolve, Franklin's new council will try to have more orderly meetings with a special time allotted for hearing the views of the people and an adjournment time of 11:30 p.m.

Future meetings will start at 7 p.m. instead of 8 and an agenda of village business will be delivered to councilmen before each meeting.

Councilmen Donald Hunter and Calvert Thomas prepared a schedule of procedure, which will be tried May 12. It specifies 15 minutes, starting at 9:30 for an immediate expression from the public.

Anyone wishing council action should contact the village clerk, Mrs. Mildred Taylor, and submit details in writing not later than Monday noon one week before the meeting.

The agenda will be posted in bulletin boards in the village. Minutes of previous meetings, committee reports and old business will be covered between 7:30 and 9:30.

Monday's meeting lasted till 11:45 a.m. and where a backlog of unfinished business necessitated the calling an extra meeting next Monday.

S'field Offers \$27,500 for Land For Playground

SOUTHFIELD—Southfield board of education Monday approved a motion offer Louise Lathrop Kelley \$27,500 for a 200-ft. strip of property adjacent to the rear of Lathrop school.

The board, which has long sought the property for additional playground area, read a letter from Mrs. Kelley offering to sell the property for \$28,000. She had been asked to "get off the slow-roasting boat" and take action.

The property consists of one and a tenth acre. According to school officials, it has been assessed for them at \$55 a foot.

The district earlier tried to get the property through condemnation proceedings, although Mrs. Kelley objected that the property was commercial. The condemnation jury awarded \$20,000 half of the sum she asked.
