Franklin Asks Park Study

FRANKLIN—Village President Grant Sivier Monday told the planning commission to consider recreation areas in the village.

"We're building up so fast, there isn't going to be any place for our children to play if we don't plan now," Sivier said. He recommended that the village property, which could be preserved for village playgrounds and parks, be donated to the city. Sivier said that would be a big step. He said individual families should provide themselves with sufficient land for private playground needs, or that neighborhoods could buy lots close by.

Kidnapped Light Stays Kidnapped

BLOOMFIELD—The case of the missing street light was solved Monday, but the verdict wasn't what the residents wanted.

Two residents of Maple road near Franklin complained to the city that a street light had been "kidnapped" from their front yard.

The residents said that a petition with dozens of signatures of residents from all parts of Bloomfield demanding the light be replaced, and asking for more lights.

TRUSTEE HOMER CASE explained that the light had been moved to a dangerous intersection. He said there was no valid reason for returning it to the middle of a block.

Residents argued the light had been there 30 years and should, if for that reason only, be put back. They said they now needed to leave porch and house lights on to prevent robberies.

The defense was to no avail, however. Case and the board stood pat on their verdict.

FRANKLIN—A new subdivision has opened here at McKinney's Franklin Village Farms, developed by John L. Roberts, is open on Thirteen Mile road a half-mile west of Telegraph.
