## Churches Plan United Good Friday Services

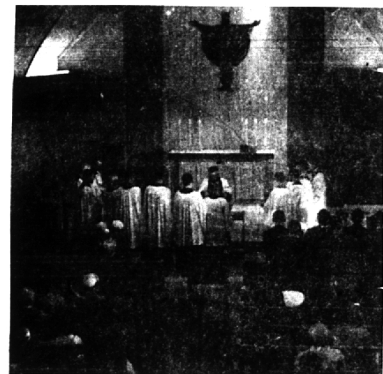

## Antique Show Set

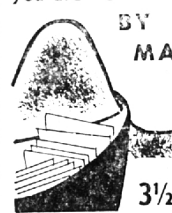
