Woodcreek Farms Sees Tax-Free Year Ahead

WOODCREEK FARMS - If all goes well in the village of Woodcreek, for the fiscal year beginning July 1 residents can look forward to another tax-free 12 months.

The council met Tuesday to discuss the proposed budget and agreed that operating expenses and a six month collection of rubbish after Jan. 1 could be gracefully handled with funds anticipated for the general fund.

About \$2500 is estimated from state sales and intangible taxes, inspection fees, culvert permits and others.

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O.K. Oiling Franklin's Major Roads

FRANKLIN - Stanley Hunter, Franklin's new street administrator, has been authorized to receive and approve permits for the application of dust-laying materials on village roads, the council said Monday night, as the direct March in years brings the perennial problem early.

Some oiling will be allowed, but only on the three major roads, Wellington, scenic and Woodside (from 13 Mile to Franklin road) only provided that this is done by all the residents with adjacent properties in each block area.

RESIDENTS CAN make their own choice on these three streets for either oil or dust, but the council insists on uniformity in a block long stretch, to keep maintenance costs within reason.

Oil will not be permitted on any of the village's local roads, since there is only \$120 per mile received from the state, limiting the amount of maintenance work to be done on a 12 month basis.

Since Wellington, scenic and a portion of Woodside receive about \$240.00 per mile as major roads, the council agreed the inevitably greater cost of maintaining oil roads could be borne if necessary.

HOWEVER, they warned that property owners using oil would probably be faced with a greater assessment when it comes time to improve these roads within the next three years. Since oil roads require more work before resurfacing, this cost would be reflected in assessments.

Hunter recommended that Calcium Chloride users should obtain the liquid treatment for greater penetration. The cost of using either oil or Calcium Chloride is about \$2.00 per square yard for each property owner and is not paid for by the village. Such is the collection of money for treatment a council function.
