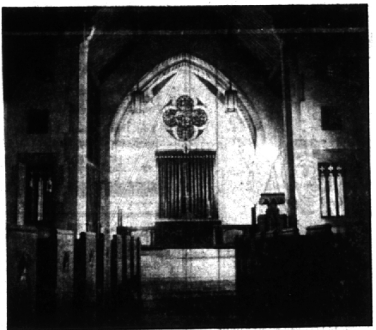

Two chartered buses stopped in Detroit last Thursday night, carrying 60 Europeans. Only minutes before the 60 had entered the United States for the first time via Canada.

When the buses stopped at the Church of Our Father, Detroit, and the strangers stepped onto a good, solid American pavement for the first time, they were welcomed by their Detroit area overnight hosts and hostesses.

Among them were Mr. and Mrs. Peter B. Loomis, and Mrs. John Anker of the Unitarian church of Birmingham.

They brought their guests home for dinner, then hustled them back the next morning to board the buses, bound for Chicago.

The theme of the conference is, "The subject of religion filling a need leads me right into the statement published recently in the bulletin of North Congregational church, Northwestern at Laker.

In it the Rev. Dr. Charles Haven Myers, minister emeritus of the church, talked about the American panic-bus pushing for more scientists since Sputnik. But, he said, doctors of spirals could be sent orbiting without advancing human welfare.

"It is not science and technology that are wrong but the human heart and conscience," said this wise gentleman.

Says Dr. Myers, if the whole man and the whole race have to be saved, objectives, "We must close the colleges and prepare for the ultimate and complete extinction of humanity."

"WE SHALL continue to need historians, lawyers, poets and musicians if we are to live and function. Without philosophy (love of wisdom) we shall lose our perspective, our sense of inter-relatedness, and the world too. How desperately we need religion. Not organized religion which fosters only ecclesiasticism and power, but true religion which is freedom and fellowship.

"Without these as directives, compassion and tolerance will dry up and men will cease to care."

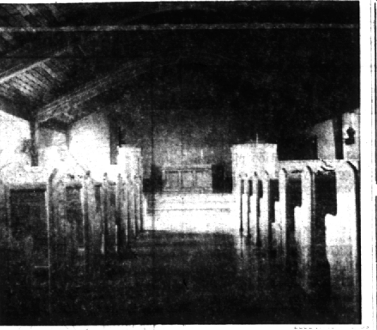
