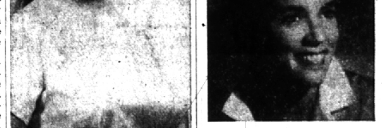

Reception followed at the home of the bride. The young couple are honeymooning at Crystal Lake.

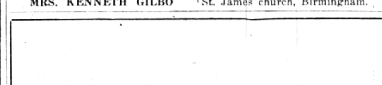
