

# Lost Maps Make Mess Of Records

FRANKLIN—Maps, maps, who's got the maps? As I try to get our records in order, I develop new areas of disorder. Fred Worden, chairman of Franklin's planning commission, helpfully reported Monday night. The planning commission is looking for certified zoning maps for the area from 1946 to 1954 to clarify the status of the Franklin road property of Mrs. Ford Ritter, who is suing the village for rezoning it from commercial to residential.

"WE HAVE the map from the township, which shows the situation in 1956 when our present zoning was adopted. But, no one seems to know the whereabouts of the village map at the time of incorporation," Worden said.

Councilmen attributed the confusion to the aftermath of the village office fire in January. Councilman Cal Thomas urged that the new certified maps be made for the village based on recorded history in the township and abstract company files.

WORDEN THEN TURNED to a report on the Franklin off-street parking survey. It revealed that Franklin road businesses were providing ample off-street parking facilities, "but people just aren't utilizing them," thus the congestion on Franklin road," he said. ## Franklin Says No To Access Road

FRANKLIN—Frederic K. Graef, real estate dealer, received a polite but firm "no" Monday when he asked the village council for permission to build an access road to lot 77 on the Irving road right of way.

Although Graef had offered to assume the village of any responsibility for the 400-foot road, the council agreed with some passion that new roads must meet minimum road standards.

ROAD Commissioner Stanley Hunter said Graef's only solution was to get all the adjacent property owners to share the cost of building a proper road which the village could accept.

Hunter also suggested that a new census might make the village eligible for \$4,000 more road funds each year. The population has jumped from the 1950 census figure of 359 to about 2,200, he said.

Residents are interested in vacating a portion of Irving road and a road in the Hersheyville area where a neighborhood playground is planned, he said.

## Franklin Gets Tough Policy On Sale Signs

FRANKLIN—The village council "got tough" Monday and decided to "settle this sign business" by enforcing the ordinance limiting the size and placement of signs.

The council instructed local police to remove every sign violating the code—and according to one count there are at least 21 violations involving every real estate office with listings in the village. The sign law in Franklin limits real estate signs on single homes to residential areas to three square feet in size and stipulates that they must be at least 12 feet from the road. Signs in violation can be removed by police after five days notice and a summons issued.
