Your child takes his first step away from home when he starts school. How easy will it be for him to find his place in the new environment, to absorb new learning experiences? A great deal depends on the pre-school training he gets from his parents.

School is much more than a mill for turning out 3-R skills. American education also concerns itself with the development of inquiring minds, well functioning personalities, responsible citizenship. These qualities can be fostered in the pre-school years.

BEGINNING in babyhood, parents should give a child as much freedom as possible to explore his small world.
