

# Chorale Member Recalls European Tour Highlights

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Bunny Lyon is one of two Bloomfield Hills girls now touring Europe and staying with native families with the Michigan Chorale, a 75-member vocal group whose purpose is interpreting America to people of other lands through music. Miss Lyon, Birmingham road, and Sallie Garabrant, Cranford road, both seniors at Kingswood school, will return from the two-month tour next week, following a final concert at the University of Fair. Following are excerpts from Miss Lyon's record of events on the trip from July 10-30, sent to her parents.)

This morning (July 11) we went to Cologne where we saw the magnificent cathedral and also the new, modern opera house. Returned to Bonn by train.

That night they gave a German style party for me. There I met three Hungarian refugees, who came from Budapest to American girls. Even when we walk down the street men stare at us.

We took the train to Mainz and changed there for the ride to Oppenheim. When we arrived we attended a reception given by the lord mayor in the market place. I was one of the girls living in Nierstein, so we had to take the train there and then walk to our houses.

The next week we went to Oppenheim where we had a tour through a winery, including the dark wine cellars. Tuesday we attended a reception by the burgomaster of Nierstein at his official residence. We learned to taste wine. We sampled six different kinds of Nierstein Rhine wine and ate rolls for you always do when tasting wines.

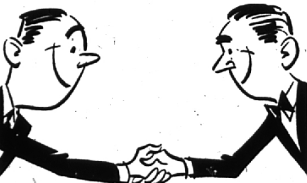
