

### Franklin Joins War On Dutch Elm Blight

FRANKLIN — Franklin's council is on the march against Dutch elm disease. Councilman Jack Roberts reported Monday that he and a representative of Davey tree surgeons had inspected elms in the vicinity of Branchville, Lawrence, north Dorchester and Haverford drive. A dozen property owners were notified that trees were diseased and must be cut down and burned within ten days.

Roberts said he would attempt to enlist the aid of local garden groups for better control of the blight. He offered to prepare an ordinance based on similar legislation in neighboring communities, which would be ready for council action by the first of next year.

Noxious weed control in Franklin is also slated for early consideration, the council agreed.

### U-D Season Ticket Sales Begin Here

The University of Detroit's season football ticket sales campaign is underway in the Birmingham area, with Alvin S. Rappoport, 3570 Middlebury, chairman of the sales team for the fourth straight year.

The Titan schedule, which opens Sept. 19, is one of the finest in the school's history and includes three foes making their first appearance in Michigan—the U. S. Air Force academy, Arizona State college and George Washington university.

The first three home games on the U of D schedule will be played at night, and the 25 teams, with 437 salesmen, are shooting for a record goal of 7,500 season book sales.
