A pumper truck will be transferred from the township station on Telegraph road to the new station. The township now has on order a four-wheel drive one-ton truck being outfitted with rescue equipment for the new station. It also will be used for smoke investigations and grass fires.

Even when the new station is in operation, Case emphasized, all fire department calls will go through the Telegraph road station. It will have a direct line to the east side station and will dispatch all calls from there.

ONE FIREMAN will be on duty at the new station and two at the Telegraph station. Case said this will bring the township fire staff to ten, increasing it from the present six.

The fire department also has about 15 volunteer firemen, some of whom live in the east side area. These volunteers have been trained by Chief Ralph Hemmerly, who has held training sessions on alternate Monday nights. They are called to help with home fires.

Ends Clerical Course

Neat Ditching Specified for Bristol Lane

BINGHAM FARMS — Evan Reim, street administrator, Monday was given the go-ahead to ditch Bristol lane. But Bingham's council added a word to the resolution and underscored it—neatly. Authorizing about \$700 for the ditching job, the council explicitly states that debris turned up by the contractor must be hauled away. Though this may add to the cost, the council was determined that property owners would not be plagued by heaps of rubble which brought sharp criticism after ditching of Bingham road last spring.

Reim also said there would be no further calcium chloride treatment to local roads this year. A general scarifying and grading of all roads will be accomplished before fall, he said. Bingham has \$5,508 in its road fund at the moment.

S'field to Study Planning Contract

SOUTHFIELD — The contract for a 98-month, \$19,000 planning consultant for the city of Southfield, was referred back to the planning commission and city attorney James Allen for study Monday. The contract, proposed by the commission, was for retaining Albert Munson.

Allen questioned the payment system, a combination of by the month and by the job. It provides fees of \$500 a month, and also breaks the planning job into sections with a rate for each. Additional fees of \$10 per hour are to be paid for attending more than one meeting a month and for court work.
