SIDEWALK NOTICE
A recent survey indicates that certain sidewalk in the area of construction at the hereinafter described property. The City of Birmingham Sidewalk Ordinance No. 287, requires that this notice be given, stating the City's intention to make this improvement. However, the ordinance provides that the owner may cause this work to be done at his own expense, provided the work is completed within 30 days from the date of this notice in accordance with Commission Resolution No. 287, 1948, which authorized the work. The Ordinance provides that the work shall be done in conformity with the specifications of the Engineering Department of the City and that a permit shall be secured prior to the construction of the sidewalk.

The City is preparing to let a contract for sidewalk construction, and in the event the property owner does not cause the work to be done within 30 days from the date of this notice, the City will proceed to have the work constructed by its contractor and assess the cost against the property owner. 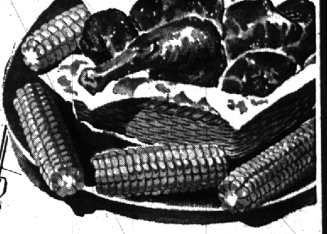
