They were there to protest vehemently that Cornell, a residential street near Northland center, would become a junior expressway to Northland center because no outlet is provided at 9 Mile. The protesters estimate that 6,500 cars per day would whosh past their homes.

AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

Notice is hereby given that a public hearing will be held Monday, September 15, 1958, at 8:00 P.M. in the Municipal Building, for the purpose of considering and adopting Ordinance No. 517, being the Zoning Ordinance, by amending said Ordinance to permit the minimum distance between residential lots to be reduced by one-half foot for every foot that the lot is less than 30 feet in width.

Objections to the proposed amendment must be filed in writing and be requested that any such communications be submitted to the City Clerk on or before noon, Thursday, September 11, 1958, so that they may be filed and forwarded to members of the City Commission prior to the meeting on September 15, 1958.

A SIDEWALK NOTICE

A recent survey indicates that certain sidewalk is in need of construction at the hereinafter described property. The City of Birmingham Sidewalk Ordinance No. 247, requiring that this notice be given, stating the City's intention to construct the sidewalk, and the ordinance states that the owner may cause the work to be done at his expense within 30 days from the date of this notice. If the owner fails to do so, the City will cause the work to be done in conformity with the specifications of the Engineering Department of the City and that a permit shall be obtained prior to the construction of the sidewalk.

The City is prepared to let a contract for sidewalk construction and in the event the property owner does not elect to do the work, the City will proceed to have the work constructed by a contractor and assess the cost against the property owner.

It is estimated that the cost for such sidewalk construction work will be approximately \$1,000 per square foot. The City Engineer will be responsible for the accurate placement of the Engineering Department at 1100 West Merrill's Plat Lot 11.
