

Grace Tops State Trio At Tucson

TUCSON, Ariz.—Tom Grace of Birmingham led all Michigan golfers in the 18th International Jaycee golf tournament which concluded Saturday at Tucson's El Rio country club.
Grace shot a final day 38-35—73 for a 230, 12 strokes behind champion Jerry Greenbaum of Atlanta, Ga.
Pete Green of Franklin shot a final 38-39—77 for 236, followed by Chuck Newton of Ann Arbor, 36-39—75 for 307.

NEWTON'S BEST shot of the day was a 130-yard wedge on the ninth hole. It fell four feet from the pin. He also holed a 10-foot putt. Green captured a 15-footer, as did Grace in Saturday's action. Grace had a 73 Friday Green carding a 75.

Special Deer Seasons Ok'd

LANSING—Special deer hunting seasons were approved by the state conservation commission at its August meeting.
The commission adopted a program to establish "any deer" seasons in 37 designated areas of the state. Under the plan, 35,000 permits would be issued to hunters in an effort to take 22,543 deer of any age, either sex, in addition to the regular buck kill.

THE "ANY DEER" seasons in northern areas of the state would run concurrently with the regular November 15-30 deer season.
The approved regulations now are subject to review by the legislative joint interim committee on administrative rules.

Burkemo 3rd In State Open

GRAND BLANC—Defending champion Wally Burkemo of Franklin Hills was forced to take a back seat to Grand Rapids pro John Barnum in the Michigan Open at nearby Atlas Valley last weekend.
Barnum, the event's 1961 titlist, fired a 65 Sunday morning, then capped three rounds of fine play with a 71 on the final 18 for a 272 aggregate.
This was eight strokes better than Chick Harbert's 280 that capped runner-up honors. Burkemo was third with 281.

BURKEMO was after his fourth Michigan Open crown. Chuck Koels was low amateur with 286, good for fifth. He has won the Open three times.
Burkemo had individual rounds of 71, 70, 69 and 71. He capped a \$400 prize split. Top money was \$750.
Gene Bone of Tam O'Shanter tied for 11th at 290.

Waterfowl Laws Stay About Same

LANSING—Waterfowl hunting regulations in Michigan will remain the same as last year except for a change in bag limits on reared and canvasback ducks. Regulations approved by the state conservation commission include a 70-day season on ducks and geese, Oct. 1-Dec. 9.
Shooting hours also are unchanged, opening a half-hour before sunrise and closing at sunset. Wood ducks again will be protected throughout the state.
Effective this season, the daily bag limit of four ducks may not include more than two of either reared and canvasback species, or more than one each.

THE POSSESSION limit on reared and canvasbacks also is modified and the eight duck limit may not include more than four of either species, four in the aggregate of both reared and canvasbacks.

Will Treat More Streams For Lamphrey

LANSING—The U. S. Fish and Wildlife service has been granted permission to chemically treat 18 additional streams in the upper peninsula for the purpose of destroying sea lamprey larvae.
The 18 new streams, all tributary to Lake Superior, bring to 30 the number of Michigan rivers and creeks where lamprey poisoning may be conducted. Earlier permits covered five streams flowing into Lake Superior, five into Lake Huron and two tributaries to Lake Michigan.

COVERED UNDER the newest permit area: Waikoa and Betsy rivers, Chippewa county; Little Two Heart and Two Hearted rivers, Luce county; Seven Mile and Beaver creeks and Miners and Au Train rivers, Alger county; Big Garlic, Iron and Pine rivers, Marquette county; Huron river, Baraga county; Little Gratiot river, Keweenaw county; Traverse and Salmon Trout rivers, Houghton county and Misery, Firesteel and Cranberry rivers, Ontonagon county.

71 Wins Stag

A 71 by Howard Hamilton capped low gross honors among guests at Tam O'Shanter country club's annual stag day golf journey Aug. 20. Paul Yarrow topped member players with a 75.

State Adds Land, Defers Quail Hunt

LANSING—The state conservation commission, at its August meeting, approved purchase of 417 acres of land for public hunting and acquisition of three parcels of land for public fishing sites.
The hunting lands are for addition to four state game areas in southern Michigan, while the new fishing sites will be on the Platte river, Benzie county; Manistee river, Kalamazoo county; and Davis lake, also in Benzie county.

AMONG OTHER action, the commission deferred for this year a proposed quail hunting test at the conservation department's Rose lake wildlife experiment station.

Plan Outdoorama At Walled Lake

WALLED LAKE—Multi-Lake Conservation association will hold its third annual outdoorama at its club grounds here Sept. 13-14.
Events planned include bait and fly casting exhibitions by national champions Ben Hardesty and Paul Cowan; skeet shooting exhibitions by state and national titlists; a small arms and sub-machinegun demonstration, by a state police specialist; field dog trials; archery and trap events.
