Three finals matches will be played Sunday afternoon—women's singles at 2 p.m., mens singles at 3 p.m. and mens doubles at 4 p.m. Forestry and parks department workmen are bringing the Elton courts to top shape for the tournament. Blosschers will be erected to accommodate contestants and spectators.

Tournament director Parry Tuesday emphasized two important points contestants should remember.

- (1) Report on time for matches. A default will be declared if a player is more than 15 minutes late.
- (2) All contestants should furnish at least one new or playable ball for matches through the semi-finals. The recreation department will furnish new balls for the finals matches.

Scheduling allows one hour for each match. Players will be given five minutes warm-up time.

Handsome revolving trophies, to stay with the eight division champions a year, and the engraved medals which will go to winners and runners-up will be on display at the tournament officials' table.

For Top Netters

Americans City's First State LL Title Contenders

Birmingham sent its first representative to Michigan's Little League championship tournament at Ypsilanti yesterday.

The Birmingham Americans copped Saturday afternoon at Elton park. It was the first district title for a local all-star team.

Port Huron was Birmingham's first foe in the seven-team state tournament.

Walled Lake scored twice in the first inning but Birmingham countered with one run in the bottom of the frame and four in the second.

TOM ANGELL'S hitting was responsible for the Birmingham win. He drove in the first score on a fielder's choice, then hammered a grand slam home run far over the right centerfield fence.

Dick Mosher was the winning pitcher. He gave up six hits and struck out 10, walking none. Birmingham collected five hits.

The Americans needed three wins to reach the title game. They thumped Lathrup, 7-1, in first-round play July 30, drubbed the Southfield Nationals, 20-0, in the second round last Thursday and then scored a lopsided, 7-2 semi-final triumph over the Birmingham Nationals.

Walled Lake drew a first-round bye, then advanced on a 10-2 win over Novi and an 8-0 defeat over the Southfield Americans.

ANGELL HURLED a one-hitter for the Birmingham in their win over Lathrup. Two were out in the sixth inning before the losers picked up their lone safety.

Mosher had a two-run homer and a double for the Americans. He handled the mound chores in the Southfield Nationals battle, giving up three hits and fanning 13. Angell took over the pitching duties against the Birmingham Nationals, fanned 10 and honored.

The Elton tourney saw one hitter, by Fenton's Jim Cunningham in his team's 1-0 first-round victory over Milford. He struck out 18 and walked four.

B'ham Boy Skeet King

Eddie Brown, 13-year-old son of a Birmingham auto dealer, won the National Skeet Shooting association's junior title last week in the world championships at Oakland County Sportsman's club, Waterford.

He dropped one bird in his final 250 target round to miss the world all-gauge championship.

The youth, who won several other national divisional titles in the week-long skeet tourney, defeated Jimmy Settlage of Waukesha, Wis., in the junior final. His foe shot a 246-250.
