## 'Mosaics for Everyone' Lecture at B'ham High

"Anything can be art and anyone can be an artist." This  
 challenge is the theme of a lecture entitled "Mosaics for  
 Everyone" to be given at the Birmingham high school auditor-  
 ium at 7:30 p.m. on Dec. 12 by Sisters Magdalen Mary and  
 Mary Corita.

The Sisters are a two-woman art  
 department at Immaculate Heart  
 college in Los Angeles.

"WITHIN THE LAST few  
 years," according to Paul Averill,  
 president of the Bloomfield Art  
 Association which is sponsoring the  
 lecture, the Sisters have evolved a  
 significant and joyous new ap-  
 proach to mosaics and other art  
 forms. We believe that its stimu-  
 lating effect should be brought to  
 our area especially for the non-  
 professional."

The Sisters are today leaders of  
 what is known around the country  
 as "Immaculate Heart College  
 style." The work which they have  
 inspired is recognized not only by  
 the Metropolitan Museum of Art  
 but by the National Gallery of Art  
 and Museum of Modern Art.

RIOTOUS COLORS, shapes and  
 forms are used in all sorts of  
 media from cookie molds to every-  
 day trassers.

"It often seems to us," says Sister  
 Magdalen Mary, "that what we do  
 is simply help adults go back to  
 the unconscious joy in art that  
 children have. That is why our  
 department's work is often charac-  
 terized as primitive."

In their talk the Sisters will get  
 down to the fundamentals of pro-  
 ducing mosaics, both flat and  
 dimensional. They will touch on the

use of broken bits of bottle and  
 other glass, unusual colors and  
 textures obtained by fusing old  
 coke, gingerale, milk of magnesia  
 and other bottles of glass.

"THE SISTERS have developed  
 one of the few art approaches in  
 the country in which the non-  
 professional can get involved and  
 excited," says W. L. Dennis, a di-  
 rector of the Bloomfield Art As-  
 sociation.

"They are real teachers. We hope  
 by bringing them here we can pro-  
 vide an interesting and lasting ex-  
 perience to those non-professionals  
 who are looking for creative out-  
 lets."

The Friday evening program at  
 the high school auditorium will  
 consist of a basic talk by the Sis-  
 ters followed by a "coffee-break"  
 for all present and then the Sisters  
 will continue with mosaic slides  
 and a question and answer period.

TICKETS MAY BE obtained at  
 the door, or earlier at Grinnell  
 Brothers in Birmingham.

In the afternoon of that same  
 day, the Bloomfield Art Association  
 will sponsor a program at the  
 Birmingham YMCA by the Sisters  
 for students of the upper grades  
 in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area.

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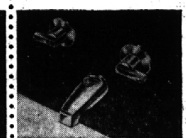
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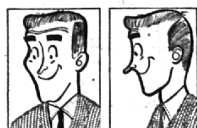
