NOTICE

SERVICEMEN AND VETERANS
HOMESTEAD TAX EXEMPTION

IF YOU ARE:

1. A veteran of the Spanish American War.
2. A veteran of World War No. I and have a service or non service connected disability recognized by the United States Veterans Administration upon which compensation is paid.
3. An active service man.
4. A veteran of World War No. II who has a service or non service connected disability recognized by the United States Veterans Administration upon which compensation is paid.
5. Unmarried widow of any of above.
6. Resident of State at least 6 months prior to service.
7. Resident of State at least 5 years prior to filing affidavit.

THEN YOU ARE entitled to homestead tax exemption
on \$2,000 of assessed value, PROVIDED: on January
1, 1959, you owned and occupied the property as a home-
stead, did not own property assessed at more than
\$7,500, make application between January 1st and
March 1, 1959.

Application may be made at the office of the City As-
sessor, Municipal Building, who will assist you.

BRING deed or land contract, discharge papers, RE-
CENT proof of receiving compensation for service or
non service connected disability, if you are receiving
same.

We respectfully suggest that application be made as
soon after January 1st as possible.

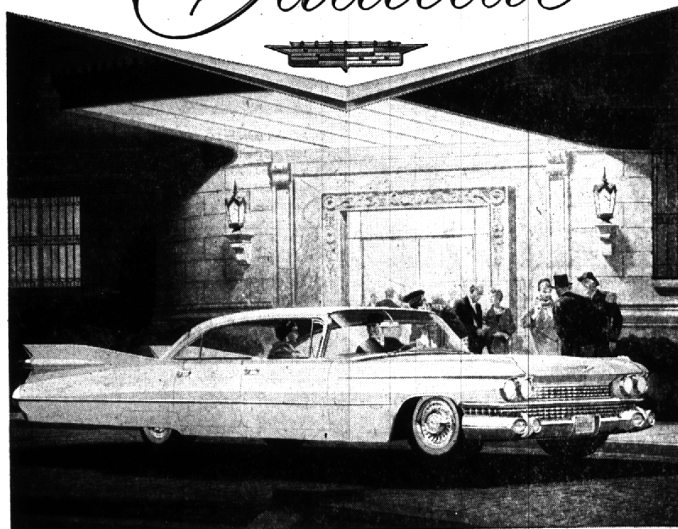
