Cubs Help Goodwill

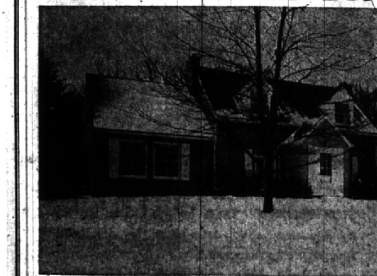

????? On Roads Mailed To Franklin Residents

FRANKLIN—Residents are urged to RSVP - PDQ upon receipt of a road questionnaire being mailed this week by the council.

This is not a vote—merely a polling of opinions to guide the council in determining future actions such as whether to place the question of taxation for road funds on the March ballot. The questionnaire presents several different road improvement programs which would cost residents from two mills to seven and a half mills.

Setting a deadline for signed replies at Dec. 31, the council assumes that many have already formulated ideas about the kind of roads they want. The questionnaire presents a factual cost analysis based on 25 miles of village roads and a five-year assessment plan.

Divided into two major sections, the questionnaire deals with bringing Franklin's present sub-standard gravel roads up to conditions which would make maintenance costs comparable with road money received from the state on a road mileage and per capita basis.

Several less expensive programs are suggested and alternative methods of payment. And there's even a place for keeping roads as they are.

But, it is contended that if residents are willing to pay up to 7½ mills annually for the next five years, the village could add sufficient gravel, restore road crowns, provide adequate drainage and

have an automatic dust-control program with three general applications of calcium chloride each year.

AND IF this is done, the council says that maintenance costs would be reduced proportionately, making it possible for the village to contribute up to 30 per cent for the cost of eventual improvement.

"The \$12,200 we get from state monies every year for road maintenance simply isn't enough to do more than a patch job on the roads that are far below standard to begin with," the street administrator has repeatedly told complainers and colleagues.

Other attempts to make informal surveys have failed to give the council conclusive information to work with so the questionnaire is a direct appeal to residents to "speak now."

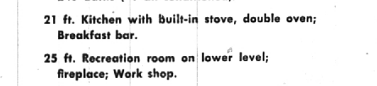
