Week of Mar. 13

Four state-wide groups—state police, sheriffs, Michigan education association, and the state superintendent of public instruction—urged the state house of representatives to approve the school bus law endorsed by The Birmingham Eccentric.

Bloomfield Township Police Chief Norman Dehnke estimated the 10 youths involved in garage lootings in the Bloomfield area had smashed around 800 garages.

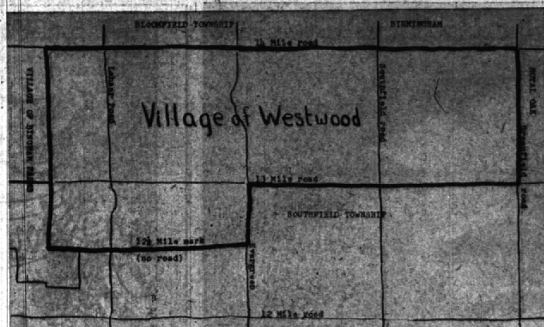
Mr. and Mrs. Raymond E. Cecil sued the City of Birmingham for a total of \$60,000 damages in an accident suffered by Mrs. Cecil. She blamed an "improperly placed" cover over a sprinkling system at Spradley golf course for the accident.

Franklin village swept out its incumbents. President Harold Roseberry, Clerk Faye F. Hawk, and Councilman J. Robert Mitchell. Voters elected Grant Sliver, president; Mrs. Mildred Taylor, clerk, and councilmen Edward Green, Clavert Thomas and Eugene Ka-week.

Bloomfield township residents met in a mass tax protest meeting at Bloomfield Hills high school, protesting the township's reassessment program.

The high cost of educating children and decreasing funds led Birmingham School Superintendent Dwight B. Ireland to predict a possible budget deficit for the schools in '59-60.

A "watchdog" society to keep an eye on Bloomfield township affairs and report board meetings to residents is being planned by the group which led the protest against tax reassessments. They plan to "find out where the money is going."

Westwood council recommended a village tax of \$4.80 per thou-

sand, and an interim assessment of \$2.15 to rthe first year and a half of village operation.

A spectacular blaze marked the end of a tumbledown barn on 13 Mile road west of Telegraph in Franklin. The structure, an eyesore in the area for some time, was doused with kerosene by Franklin firemen to give them practice and a chance to test equipment.

Four industrial scientists became classroom instructors at Bloomfield Hills high school in a forward-looking industry education experiment.

Tots to teenagers visited Baldwin public library during National Library Week. The "Wake Up and Read!" slogan is just what the youngsters did.

Michigan heart association's new president, Dr. F. D. Dordick, a Bloomfield Hills surgeon who conceived and developed the first mechanical heart used successfully on human patients, was installed at the association's annual meeting in Detroit.

For the umpteenth time, the Michigan house of representatives postponed a final vote on a bill

providing for safer school bus loading conditions. Stopping traffic on two-lane roads merits much consideration.

Thirty-three candidates filed for office in the city of Southfield. The four candidates for mayor were Allan M. Bullock, Thomas M. Costello, Philip A. Maloney and Donald L. Swanson.

Louis A. Garavaglia, 40, a Bloomfield Hills resident and head of a huge construction firm, died with his brother and their pilot when their helicopter exploded and crashed north of Detroit.

Birmingham swimmers finished third place in the state championship meet at Ann Arbor.

Judge H. Russell Holland ruled Monday that the \$44 million 12-Town drain project is legal, that it was necessary for the public health, and that all communities involved should sign the petition for the drain to be obligated as part of it. Southfield township and Troy had claimed the drain law was void.

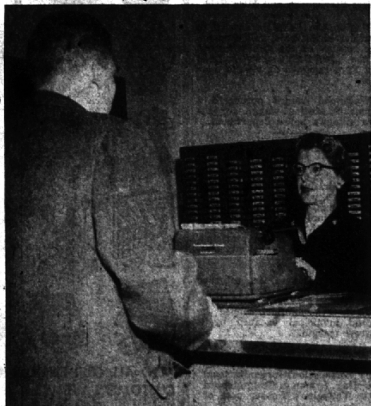

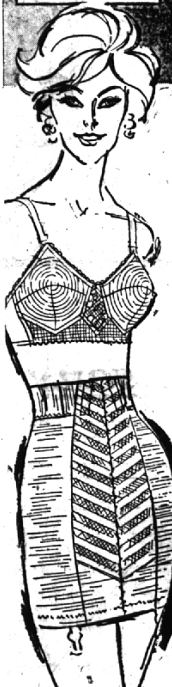

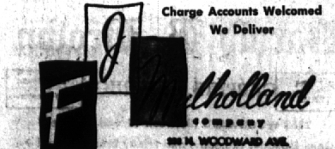
