FRANKLIN — Final arrangements for purchase lots south of the Franklin community church are being negotiated these days by the Franklin Community Association.

Unanimous agreement to consummate the \$35,000 sale came Dec. 17 when the association and its specific members signed off on the subdivision members' contract. Before the agreement with G. W. Smith, developer, the association voted to go ahead regardless, thus reserving a large parcel of land for civic use.

Ultimately the association plans to develop the acreage for a recreation center.

Although there is some opposition to the proposed use, association members felt it necessary to acquire the property now rather than later, the remaining large parcels available in the rapidly growing community.

ZONED residential permission was given recently by the zoning board of appeals for a civic center and recreation area. Plans are for building a community hall, a lot with space for 111 hall diamonds, tennis courts and other facilities.

Waivers from all subdivision owners are needed to fulfill the legal requirements.
