

## No Maple Speed Limit Increase Until Widening

Birmingham will wait until Maple is widened the rest of the distance to Cranbrook before raising speed limit to 35 mph. City commissioner heard Traffic Consultant T. M. Vandertempel advise against raising the present 30-mph limit at this time. He said Westbound traffic turning left onto Argyll, right where the payment now narrows to one lane, already causes a hazardous condition. He said a 5-mph increase would make it more so. The county has agreed on the widening next summer.
