Accept Minister to Fill Congregational Church Vacancy

At a special meeting Nov. 23rd, The Congregational Church of Birmingham voted unanimously to call Rev. Raymond A. Fenner to serve as minister, filling the vacancy created by Rev. Robert D. Dewey, recently called to the Community Congregational Church of Garden City, N. Y.

Mr. Fenner, a native of Columbus, Ohio, is currently minister of Yale Divinity school in 1952. Mr. Fenner, a graduate of Ohio State University, saw service in World War II with both the Air Force and the Infantry in England, France, Belgium and Germany.

Upon his graduation from Yale, he became minister of youth at the Congregational Church of Manchester, N. Y., and also served the church as minister of Christian education and associate minister.

In May, 1949, he married Miss Jean Anderson of Columbus, Ohio, also a graduate of Ohio State University. They have three children, two sons and a daughter.

Mr. Fenner will begin his ministry here February 15, 1959.

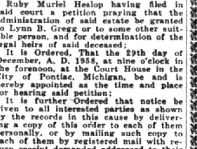

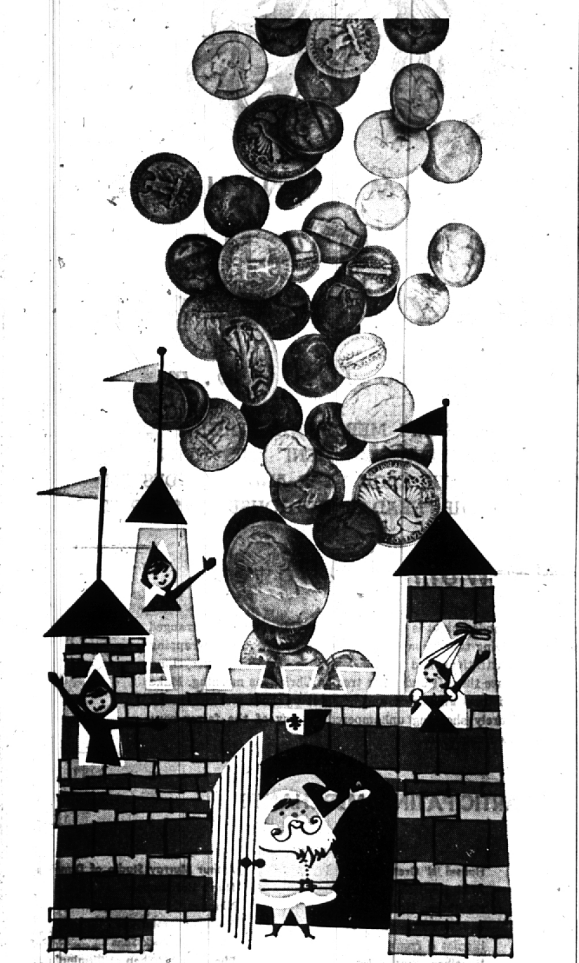
