ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS

The Redford Township Board will receive sealed bids for the disposal of its garbage and rubbish under the following alternate plans:

1. Contractor to build, maintain and operate necessary transfer facilities upon land furnished by the Township so that garbage and rubbish may be transferred to the contractor's vehicles and disposed of by the contractor outside of the Township. Amount of garbage and rubbish to be disposed of consists of approximately eighty (80) tons per day, more or less. The Township of Redford will use its own equipment and personnel to pick up all of the garbage and rubbish and deliver it to the central transfer point. Contractor to furnish a Performance Bond in the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000). Contractor must have or obtain the necessary approval of the State, County and Municipality involved, and also the approval of the Health Department concerned.

2. Contractor to furnish and maintain a dumping site only for the disposal of rubbish and garbage which shall be adequate, available and sufficient for a period of not less than five (5) years. Use of this facility may be terminated at the option of the Township, at any time during the lease period, by the Township giving a ninety (90) day notice to that effect, and upon such termination there shall be no future liability on the part of the Township. Contractor shall furnish a Performance Bond in the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), guaranteed by the availability of a dumping site for both rubbish and garbage for the period. Contractor must have or obtain the necessary approval of the State, County and Municipality involved, and also the approval of the Health Department concerned.

All sealed bids should be mailed or delivered to the office of Margaret Peoples, Township Clerk, on or before Thursday, December 11, 1958 at 3:00 p.m. Bids are to be made on an annual basis. Bids must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check in an amount not less than five (5%) percent of the bid, which sum is to be retained by the Township as a good faith deposit.

The Township Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids, waive any informality in bids, and to accept the bid that, in the opinion of the Township Board, is to the best advantage and in the best interests of the Township of Redford.

What Do You Want From Your Schools?

TO THE EDITOR:

What do you want from your schools? It might be well to consider this question before you vote on the School Millage and the School Bond issue on Monday, December 8th.

The end products of your schools to your boy or girl graduating from high school, with a large number of graduates having college in mind.

Our educational system should create a strong desire in the student from the early grades to acquire a working knowledge of the necessary subjects. A working knowledge is not a superficial knowledge and is not the end in itself. The knowledge is supposed to be used.

THE STUDENT should be a good reader above all. He should be a good speaker and have a command of English. He should be able to handle mathematics through Algebra and geometry and in some cases Trigonometry. Social Studies should give him a background for understanding the world around him. Study on through Chemistry and Physics will enable him to understand our present world.

The graduate must know and use the above knowledge to enable him to meet the competition in the present age. Comments in newspapers and magazines, of people who hire our students, are that students are not so prepared for today's life and business. Our colleges also say most of our students are not prepared for a rigid college course. The colleges have of necessity, lowered their requirements.

IN ORDER to acquire a working knowledge in the above named subjects, a student from a very early age should be taught, "How to Study." I do not know of any such courses offered on study habits. Students tell us every day that they do not know how to study. Some students seem to acquire a method, maybe instinctively, but they are few.

If they have naturally found an efficient way to master the subjects they have a further problem. Have they been trained to apply the knowledge to solve their life problems? These problems may be on many levels around the home, at school, relations with their parents, relations with other students and an infinite number of others all through life. A student should be trained to solve all these problems while in school, at least be trained in the method of solving them.

MILLAGE INCREASE or bond issues are not the answers to these three problems:

1. Creation of Desire
2. Learning "How to Study"
3. Learning how to solve "Life Problems"

The answer to these problems will come through new thinking. Do you want a new approach to education? Better results can be obtained at much lower costs.

This has already been done out of necessity in different parts of the country. The parents marvel at the improvement in the children's ability.

If you want this result you will need to forget "new thinking."

All the new reflector street signs are now up, and Stone said Lathrup has received many compliments on them.

S'field Road Report Delayed in Lathrup

LATHRUP—With requests for traffic surveys on Southfield at Lathrup school back-dated for nearly a year, with the County Road Commissioner, Lathrup's Road Safety committee there a long delay in getting a report.

City Administrator Gerald Stone told council members Monday that he had talked with the road commissioner's office regarding the survey and a manually operated signal for the Lathrup school crossing. The city seeks a reduction in the eleven-hour speed limit on Southfield road.

STONE said he was told that a quick traffic survey was out of the question, and that manually operated signals were illegal.

Mayor Richard N. Cogger said he will await written confirmation of the information given to Stone and if no action is to be taken by the end of December, the city will have to decide on steps to be taken to protect the Lathrup school children and reduce speed on Southfield road.

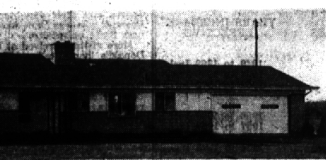
