NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City Commission of the City of Birmingham, pursuant to its statutory and charter authority, proposes to consider the enactment of an ordinance the subject matter of which is described in its title as follows:

An ordinance regulating and restricting the height, number of stories and size of buildings; the size of open spaces; the density of population; the location and use of buildings and land for trade, industry, residence and other purposes; creating districts for said purposes and establishing the boundaries thereof; providing for changes in the regulations, restrictions and boundaries of such districts; defining certain terms used herein; providing for enforcement; establishment of a board of zoning appeals; and imposing penalties for the violation of this ordinance.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that a public hearing will be held before any regulations contained in said proposed ordinance shall become effective and that such public hearing will be held on the 3rd day of March, 1958, at 8 o'clock in the evening of said day in the Commission Room in the Municipal Building in the City of Birmingham, Michigan.

All persons interested in discussing the subject matter of said ordinance are requested to be present and express their approval or disapproval of the proposed ordinance or any part thereof.

ELLIOTT EMPHASIZED that "we mean to lay it on the line at this meeting because we have tremendous job to do. Since I've been county chairman, dozens of people have asked me what 'we' Republicans are doing. Well, this meeting will give everyone a chance to see what 'we' are doing and how 'they' are doing it."

"We've learned from the Democrats that you have to campaign year-round to win elections, and we are starting early this election year. There will be a short question and answer period. We'll hold hands, and we'll have a few surprises, too."

Ahrens said he would outline the financial status of the state organization. He indicated it would be favorable. Ahrens said, "We hope to see many of our contributors at this meeting to see exactly what we're doing with their money. We have issued invitations to all contributors in the county," he added.
