WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT:

- Teenage Personality
- Juvenile Delinquency
- Rh Factor

Q. Does the personality change when a youngster reaches teenage?

A. Not always. Doctors who studied personality traits of almost 400 boys and girls found about half showed no teenage change. Various changes in personality occurred in the others. Some improved greatly—a few slipped badly.

Q. What is the main cause of juvenile delinquency?

A. Parents, according to several leading authorities who have probed the families of wayward youngsters. In almost every case where both parents and the trouble child were examined, the trouble could be traced to either the father or mother. Parent-caused delinquency occurs at all social levels. Some of the case records compiled by investigating doctors are almost beyond belief.

Q. What do doctors mean when they say a person is Rh negative?

A. They are referring to a blood factor. Unless both parents match in Rh (either positive or both negative) one or more of their children may be born with a serious blood disorder. About 15 out of 100 American white



women are Rh negative. By chance, 2 will marry Rh negative men. There is no trouble here. But the remaining 13 women will marry Rh positive men. About 1 out of 26 children born to these mismatched men and women will be more or less affected. Doctors now have ways of coping with Rh problems. 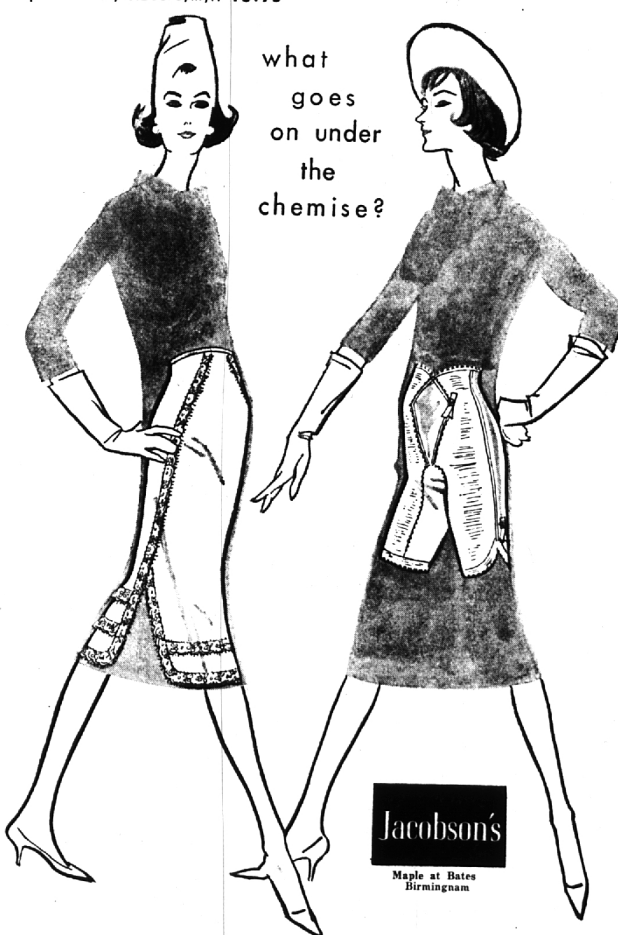
