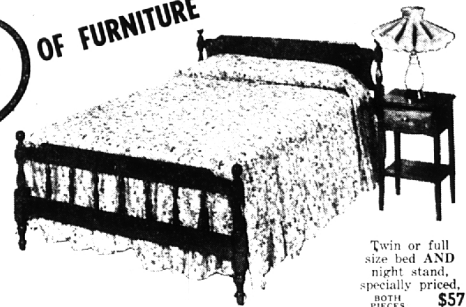

The old police department in the Troy city offices at Wattles and Livermore will be used to relieve crowding in other city departments.

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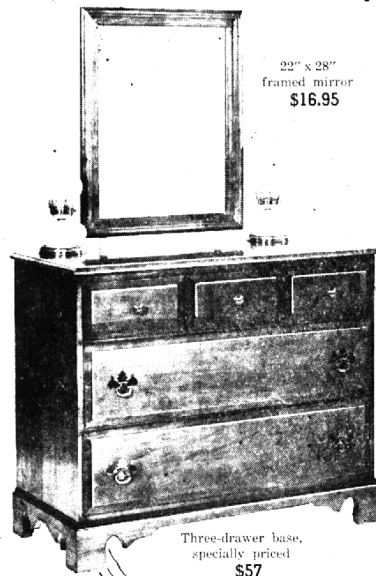
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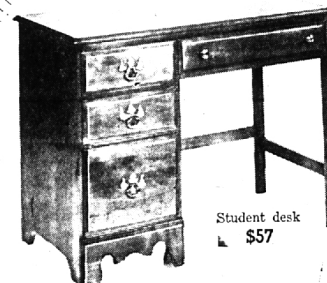
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
