In this case, it is much better to celebrate the birthday by taking your son or daughter out to dinner and to the theater or something where just the family is involved. Make sure that your present to him is nice and that you have a cake for him.

TRY TO PLEASE your children, whatever their age, where their birthday is concerned. Remember, they are only children once and do not see things the same way you do. You can be wrong you know. So give them parties. Lots of them. They'll love you for it.

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A mighty good protection for the SPRING BULBS which have the tendency to stick their little snouts out of the ground at this early date is to cover them with PEAT MOSS — and KEEP THEM COVERED until spring arrives.

The primary food supply of rabbits and hares is BARK and HERBS. At this time the only thing they can get at easily is the bark of trees—especially young trees and shrubs. You may thwart these distressing rabbit habits by:—

Putting WIRE NETTING around the trees.

Spraying or painting with PETER RABBIT REPELLENT—the best material for this area.

Distributing plenty of EAR CORN or SHELLING CORN where they can get at it.

Train your dog for 21 hour duty.

Although a bit chilly for working outside some serious insect thought should be given to the PREVENTING to be done at the first opportunity and the EQUIPMENT with which to do it. More about this next week—maybe.

We need the cooperation of a couple of home owners who have more CRABGRASS than they can stand. (We have practically none in our own yards). A new material called PAX will make its debut in this area soon. It is claimed that its distribution over crabgrass infested areas anytime between March 1st and about April 25th will inhibit the development of crabgrass seeds.

Your State College, County Agricultural Agent, our company and possibly you will be engaged in some experimental applications to determine whether PAX is what we have been looking for or simply another panacea.

If you do want to experiment with this please write us—giving your name and address, of course, the area involved and as honest a description as possible of the degree of infestations. (Incidentally, you will need a pretty good fertilizer spreader with which to apply this material).

NOTE:—This does not mean we are abandoning CHLORDANE which has given excellent results or GOOD MAINTENANCE PRACTICE, without which none of these things are much good.
