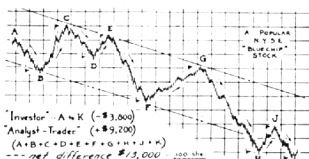

8 Assessments Underestimated Total of \$32,175

Net deficiencies in eight special assessments involved in and around three city parking lots total \$32,175, Birmingham city commissioners learned this week from City Finance Director James P. City Assessor Clark Heston was ordered to spread deficiency assessments on the properties involved.

The eight deficient projects, their final costs, and deficiencies are:

Fernside-Park alley right-of-way, cost \$14,542.55, under \$2,418.28.

Fernside-Park alley pavement, cost \$5,257.06, under \$572.23.

Fernside right-of-way, cost \$31,915.66, under \$12,818.72 net with application of \$3,229.76 refund on Fernside pavement.

Park street right-of-way, cost \$40,914.42, under \$15,086.80 net with \$5,466.38 refund from Park street pavement.

Parking Lot 3A, cost to property owners \$102,418.44, under \$6,944.02.

Parking Lot 3HH, cost to property owners \$55,730.48, under \$2,667.74.

Two other projects will have a refund.

Forest-Woodward alley, cost \$22,009.27, over \$813.08.

Parking Lot 4, cost to property owners \$50,361.59.

The two largest deficiencies—on the right-of-way for Park street and Fernside alley—resulted from jury condemnation awards which considerably exceeded the city's original estimates.

Chest X-Ray Unit to Offer Check-Ups Here

For the convenience and protection of all residents, a mobile chest X-ray unit will be stationed in Birmingham the week of March 3 to 7.

Dr. John D. Monroe, Oakland county director of health announced.

Free chest X-rays will be offered to all adults 18 and over.

The unit will be parked in back of the Municipal building, 151 Martin St.

Purpose of the X-ray survey is to find tuberculosis and other cancer cases in early stages. The chest X-ray is the only practical means of doing this, because there are no early symptoms of these diseases.

DR. MONROE SAID only one person out of every 1,000 X-rayed found to have active TB. At the same time, the X-ray sometimes helps to discover other types of disease, such as lung cancer and certain heart ailments.

No undressing is required, and the X-ray takes only a few minutes from time of registration until completion.

Dr. Monroe said the Birmingham survey will place special emphasis on getting X-rays of men over 45.

One-third of Michigan's TB cases last year were found in men in that age category, according to the national tuberculosis association.

Diabetics, also, are twice as susceptible to TB.

Registration will be in room 108. Monday hours will be 2 to 8 p.m.

Tuesday and Thursday hours will be from 12 to 8 p.m. and Wednesday and Friday the unit will be open from 9 to 5 p.m.

Bus Line May Find New Site For Warm-Ups

Birmingham's city attorney has asked for a one-week postponement of hearings in the bus's two cases against Great Lakes Greyhound company and four of its employees.

A representative of the bus company told city commissioners Monday night that the firm hopes to move the operation which brought complaints from residents near the Forest-Hunter lot where buses are warmed up.

City Manager L. R. Gore and the bus line are conferring this week on a suitable site for the parking and warm-up of the buses.

The company and its four employees have been charged with violation of the city's public nuisance ordinance, because of excessive noise and fumes from the buses.

City Attorney Jack W. Hutson, who has been criticized by citizens and at least one city commissioner, resigned Monday.

He said that the firm hopes to "reason" but added that he thought the newly elected commissioners should have a hand in picking an attorney.

Unless the recent changes the primary returns, two new faces will appear on the city commission after the general election April 7.

The city commission tabled Hutson's resignation, planning to study thoroughly all aspects of the situation and consider several alternatives.

THE NON-PARTISAN property owners league has urged Hutson's dismissal after stormy hearings about burying rubbish in the city.

Commissioner Clifford F. Sutermeister, Jr., has criticized Hutson's record in court cases.

Another controversy centered on condemnation of a piece of land for Ellensboro street. Hutson won condemnation proceedings for the city, but one property owner complained that the commission's resolution on the matter was invalid.

Three commissioners agreed.
