Mr. English was chief engineer of the Ford transmission and axle group. He joined Ford's engineering staff in 1950 as an assistant research engineer. His automotive career began in the experimental department of Oldsmobile division of General Motors in 1935, where he aided in the development of standard and automatic transmissions.

Mr. English was a graduate of Michigan State university and was a lieutenant colonel in the army during the second World War. He was a member of the Society of American Engineers and the Engineering society of Detroit.

Surviving are his wife, Maxine; a son, Daniel; a daughter, Patricia; his mother, Mrs. R. J. Lewis of Beaumont, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Roger Mann of Lansing and Mrs. Barbara Farthing of San Bernardino, Calif.; and a brother, Duncan English of California.
