## LEND AN EAR

## Records Junior Will Love—You Will Too

There are so many children's records available now that choosing one is about as confusing as selecting one product from among the few that accomplish the task. The gay outer coverings look so attractive, and make equal all claims as to the effectiveness of the contents.

But if one takes the trouble to sift through the mass of tempting facades children's records present, he will be rewarded by discovering the few that accomplish the apparently difficult task of coupling colorful presentation with intrinsic musical worth on the child's level.

When music is introduced to the youngster with boldness and imagination, not as a dry classroom exercise, it can become one of the most joyous experiences of his young life. It is then possible for music to become the basis for creative play and a tool for learning.

CHILDREN'S records should provide an exhilarating yet precise vocabulary introduction to music. At the same time they must manage to preserve musical integrity and quality. In this manner the child's possible later corrupting influences of mediocre music.

I should like to mention three records put out by The Young People's Record Guild which, above all, do not sacrifice authenticity to the expediency of a less demanding arrangement.

The first of the group consists

of The Story of Cinderella with music from the ballet, Cinderella by Prokofiev. On the other side we have The Story of the Sleeping Beauty from the ballet by Tchaikovsky.

In each side a narrator tells an ageless fairytale interlarded with little songs based on the music familiar of the musical themes of the work, combined with charming original lyrics. In this way the child picks up a familiarity with the important melodies of the composition in a relaxed and happy manner—and on a level where his imagination can lead the way for his intellect.

HOWEVER, the most distinctive aspect of these records is a symphonic presentation of the music from the original score, played by full orchestra, which shows these very same themes in their original setting. By now the child knows them and can sing along happily.

At no time is there a breach of good taste in presentation; rather there is a consistent endeavor to interest the young listener in original and undiluted musical material.

The second record, using the same interesting device includes the story of A Midsummer Night's Dream with music by Mendelssohn and Alladin and His Magic Lamp music from Scherazade by Rimsky-Korsakoff. These records instruct as they delight; and with frequent playings they soon give the young listener intimate knowl-

listening happily to atonality, because much of this record embodies many of the most common devices of contemporary music. Junior won't think anything amiss if all the instruments don't play in the same key at the same time. As presented here, it all becomes an interesting game. Different tempo—the waltz, the march and the tango—are utilized with fascinating rhythmic variation. The music literally beckons the

young listener to grab a stick and beat along with the record. And if your child does own a percussion instrument, he'll soon be off with the band marching down wonderful imaginary streets. Included in this record, as well, are full performances of the March from The Pathetic Symphony by Tchaikovsky and the March Of The Treaders from Bizet's Carmen. These demonstrate how the great composers used the march form.
