

Candidates Fill Ballot In Franklin

FRANKLIN — Grant L. Sivier has challenged Franklin's first and, so far, only village president, Harold Roseberry in the March 10 general election. Deadline for filing petitions for office was Monday noon.

Sivier was appointed to the village council last fall. Roseberry, most village clerk, Mrs. Roseberry will be opposed by Mrs. Frank Taylor, who is seeking office for the first time.

VOTERS WILL also have a

choice for treasurer, A. B. Newland the incumbent is running against James O'Neill.

However, there will be no contest for the assessor's job with Alfred C. Emswiler, the only candidate. Walter K. M. Rodgers, assessor for the past two years, declined to run again. Rodgers, however, will remain at his post as a clerk in the building department.

SEVEN candidates will vie for three council seats, open for two year terms. Two vacancies were created by Homer Hyde, who does not seek re-election, and Sivier, who seeks the presidency. Incumbent J. Robert Mitchell is seeking his third term.

The others running for council are new names on the village ballot for trustees—Edward Green, Stanley M. Hunter, Eugene Kawaiki, Ellis J. Preme, Calvert Thomas and William Worcester.

Councilmen who have another year to serve are Don Hunter, Jack Roberts and Robert Yundling.

Nuclear Engineer Gets Outstanding Man Award

WEST BLOOMFIELD—A West Bloomfield nuclear engineer, Walter John McCarthy, Jr., is one of five young men honored Saturday by the Michigan junior chamber of commerce. Lt. Gov. Philip A. Hart presented the "Michigan outstanding young man" award at a banquet at the Statler hotel, Detroit.

The awards are presented annually for outstanding service to the "candidates" communities and professions. Others named are James W. Clark, 32, mayor of the city of Marquette; John W. Fonger, 33, municipal finance administrator of the city of Holland; Dr. Milton J. Huber, Jr., 25, director of Boy's Republic in Farmington, and Stanley Jones, 31, a salesman for Burroughs corporation in Lansing.

MCCARTHY, 32, is head of the Nuclear Engineering section of Atomic Power Development Associates, Inc. His department includes reactor physics, reactor control, overall plant control, shielding, health physics and nuclear safety.

McCarthy was born in New York city and now lives at 6910 W. Dartmouth. After graduating from high school, he worked for Todd shipyard in Hoboken, N. J. Rejoining in 1945 he entered Cornell university, graduating in mechanical engineering in 1949.

IN 1951 he was selected from 20

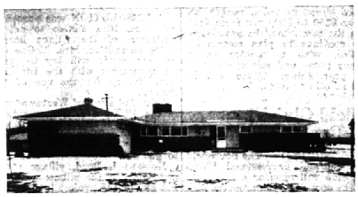
This project later became known as Atomic Power Development Associates.

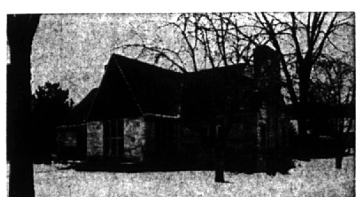
