## Village of Westwood ORDINANCE NO. 4

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION AND USE OF STREETS AND HIGHWAYS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND OTHER VEHICLES; TO PROVIDE FOR PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES; TO DEFINE DUTIES WHERE ACCIDENTS OCCUR; TO PROVIDE FOR ADMINISTRATION; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

THE VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD ORDAINS:

CHAPTER I—DEFINITIONS  
Section 1. Short Title. This ordinance may be known and cited as the Village of Westwood Traffic Ordinance.

Section 2. Definitions. Words and phrases used in this ordinance shall have their usual and customary meaning provided, however, that all words defined in the Michigan Vehicle Code, Act 200, Public Act of 1949, as amended, and used in the ordinance shall have the meaning specified therein; provided, further, that the following words and phrases as used in this ordinance shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:

Alley. Any minor thoroughfare opened to public use for purpose of ingress and egress to and from a building or lot.

Bicycle. Every device having two tandem wheels, either of which is over twenty inches in diameter, propelled by human power upon which any person may ride.

Bus Stand. A fixed area in the roadway parallel and adjacent to the curb to be occupied exclusively by buses for layover in operating schedules or waiting for passengers.

Bus. Every public motor vehicle designed for carrying more than seven passengers and used for the transportation of persons; and every motor vehicle, other than a taxicab, not used for the transportation of persons for compensation.

Center or Center Line. A continuous or broken line marked upon the surface of a roadway by paint or otherwise, to indicate the portion of the roadway allocated to traffic proceeding in the two opposite directions, and if the line is not so painted or otherwise marked, it is an imaginary line in the roadway equally distant from the edges or curbs of the roadway.

Clerk. All persons elected or appointed to the office of village clerk.

Council. In all cases where the word "council" is used in this ordinance, the same shall be synonymous with the word "commission", or any other name in the state statute in referring to a municipal legislative or governing body.

Curb Loading Zone. A space adjacent to a curb reserved for the exclusive use of vehicles during the loading or unloading of passengers or materials.

Freight Curb Loading Zone. A space adjacent to a curb for the exclusive use of vehicles during the loading or unloading of cargo.

Holidays. Where used in this code or on official signs erected by authorized official agencies shall in addition to Sundays mean the following: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. When any of said holidays fall on Sunday the following day shall be a holiday.

Municipality. The Village of Westwood.

Official Time Standard. Whenever certain hours are named herein they shall mean standard time or daylight saving time as may be in current use in this municipality.

Parking Meter Zone. An area adjacent to a parking meter set aside for the exclusive use of vehicles upon which a parking meter is used.

Passenger Curb Loading Zone. An area adjacent to a curb reserved for the exclusive use of vehicles during the loading or unloading of passengers.

Stop, Stopping or Standing. When prohibited means any stopping or standing of a vehicle whether occupied or not, other than the temporary stopping of a passenger vehicle for the purpose of and while actually engaged in picking up and discharging passengers, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with the directions of a police officer or traffic control sign or signal.

Taxicab. A licensed public motor vehicle for hire designated and constructed to seat not more than seven persons and operating as a common carrier on call or demand.

Taxicab Stand. A fixed area in the roadway parallel and adjacent to the curb set aside for taxicabs to stand or wait for passengers.

CHAPTER II—TRAFFIC'S RIGHTS AND DUTIES  
ARTICLE A—TRAFFIC-CONTROL SIGNALS; RIGHT OF WAY AND STOPS REQUIRED.

Section 1. Traffic-Control Signals (legend). Whenever traffic is controlled by traffic-control signals, such signals shall be located over the traveled portion of the roadway so as to give drivers a clear indication of the right-of-way to proceed through the intersection when approaching the intersection. Other mounting positions may be utilized only when a signalized direction is served by one or more traffic-control signals mounted on a pole or structure.

The vehicle signals shall exhibit different colored lights successively one at a time, or with arrows. The following colors shall be used and said terms and lights shall indicate and apply to drivers of vehicles as follows:

a. Green alone or "Go".  
(1) Vehicular traffic facing the signal may proceed straight through or turn right or left unless a sign at such place prohibits either such turn. But vehicular traffic, including vehicles turning right or left, shall yield the right-of-way to other vehicles and to pedestrians lawfully within the intersection or an adjacent crosswalk at the time such signal is exhibited.

b. Yellow alone or "Caution". When shown following the green or "Go" signal.  
(1) Vehicular traffic facing the signal shall stop before entering the nearest crosswalk at the intersection, but if such stop cannot be made in safety, a vehicle may be driven cautiously through the intersection.

c. Red alone or "Stop".  
(1) Vehicular traffic facing the signal shall stop before entering the nearest crosswalk at an intersection or at such other place as may be indicated by a clearly visible line and shall remain standing until green or "Go" is shown alone.

d. Red with arrows.  
(1) Green arrow (steady): Vehicular traffic facing such signal may cautiously enter the intersection only to make the movement indicated by such arrow, and shall yield the right-of-way to other vehicles lawfully within a crosswalk and to other traffic lawfully using the intersection.

(2) Red arrow (flashing): When a red arrow is illuminated by rapid intermittent flashes, drivers of vehicles shall stop before entering the nearest crosswalk at an intersection or at a limit line when marked and shall then be privileged to proceed straight ahead in the direction of the arrow. No pedestrian shall start to cross the highway at the time such signal is shown. No pedestrian shall enter the highway until they can do so safely and without interfering with any vehicular traffic.

(3) Flashing red (stop signals). When a red lens is illuminated by rapid intermittent flashes, drivers of vehicles shall stop before entering the nearest crosswalk at an intersection or at a limit line when marked and the right to proceed shall be subject to the rules applicable after making a stop at a stop sign.

(4) Flashing yellow (caution signal). When a yellow lens is illuminated with rapid intermittent flashes, drivers of vehicles may

# PUBLIC SAFETY ORDINANCE NO. 3

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY; TO COMBINE THEREIN THE FUNCTIONS, DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND THE FIRE DEPARTMENT OF THE VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD; TO CREATE THE OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SAFETY AND THE OFFICE OF PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICERS; TO DEFINE THE DUTIES, POWERS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE SAID DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SAFETY AND THE PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICERS.

THE VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD ORDAINS:

Section 1. TITLE. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Village of Westwood DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY ORDINANCE.

Section 2. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY. There is hereby created and established the Department of Public Safety for the Village of Westwood.

Section 3. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES. The Department of Public Safety shall perform all of the duties and responsibilities of the Police and Fire departments of the Village of Westwood and shall have all of the powers, duties and responsibilities conferred upon the Police and Fire services by virtue of the Charter of the Village of Westwood, ordinances of the Village of Westwood and by law, and shall have such other and additional powers, duties and responsibilities as may be lawfully imposed upon it by any administrative directive, resolution, rule, ordinance, charter provision or law.

Section 4. DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SAFETY. There is hereby created the administrative office of Director of Public Safety who shall be the administrator and head of the Department of Public Safety as herein created. The Director of Public Safety shall combine the administrative offices of the Chief of Police and Chief of the Fire Department as provided in Section 4.10 of the Charter of the Village of Westwood. The said Director shall have all of the duties, responsibilities and functions conferred upon Chief of Police and Chief of the Fire Department. He shall in addition thereto have such powers, duties and responsibilities as shall from time to time be lawfully conferred upon him by the Village Manager of the Village of Westwood and by law generally. And whenever any statute, ordinance, municipal regulation or law shall require a duty or responsibility of the Chief of Police and or Chief of the Fire Department, such duties and or responsibilities shall be assumed and performed in the Village of Westwood by the Director of Public Safety.

Section 5. APPOINTMENTS. The Director of Public Safety shall be appointed by the Village Manager of the Village of Westwood and subject to the approval of the Council of the Village of Westwood and his term of office shall be limited as provided by the Charter of the Village of Westwood. The Director of Public Safety is hereby empowered and authorized to appoint such deputies and officers as he shall deem necessary for the proper and efficient operation of the Department of Public Safety.

Section 6. INTEGRATION. The duties and responsibilities of policemen and firemen are hereby combined in the persons of Public Safety Officers, and the said Public Safety Officers shall perform such duties and responsibilities as shall be conferred upon them from time to time by the Director of Public Safety of the Village of Westwood, and provided that in addition thereto, the said Public Safety Officers shall have and perform such duties as are imposed upon policemen and or firemen by the Charter of the Village of Westwood, ordinance of the Village of Westwood and by law.

Section 7. RULES AND REGULATIONS. The Council of the Village of Westwood subject to the pertinent provisions of the Charter of the Village of Westwood, shall from time to time make such rules and regulations as it may deem expedient for the proper administration of the Department of Public Safety and or the duties, responsibilities and privileges of Public Safety Officers, and provided further that such regulations shall become effective twenty-four (24) hours after the same shall be posted on a bulletin board in the office of the Director of Public Safety.

Section 8. SEVERABILITY. Should any court of competent jurisdiction deem that any part, portion or phrase of the within ordinance to be invalid, such determination shall not thereby affect the validity of the remaining and unaffected portions of this ordinance and to such extent the Council of the Village of Westwood hereby declares the within ordinance to be severable.

Section 9. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES. All ordinances, parts of ordinances, rules and regulations of the Village of Westwood in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Section 10. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall become effective immediately upon publication.
