1000 Volunteers To Raise Funds For High Schools

Regional manager L. J. Stewart said bus service would not be affected by the sale.



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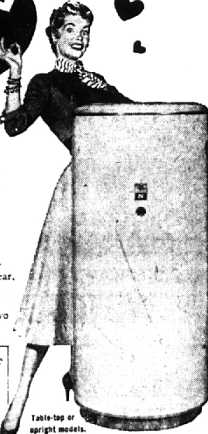


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
