Standards Topple as Maple Tankers Notch 18th Straight

It's now 18 dual wins in succession for Birmingham high's swimming squad.
Coach Jay Myers' tankers dunked Plymouth, 59 to 37, in the Maples' pool Friday night for their 11th straight dual triumph of the 57-58 campaign.
One school record and five pool-standards were toppled in the course of the evening's competition.
Pete Sirtz turned in the new school mark. He swam the 100-yard butterfly in 1:32.5, erasing his own Birmingham record of 1:38 and bettering the pool record of 1:35.5, established earlier this season by Kimball's Barry Johnson.

TOM BECHTEL, swimming in his second meet of the season, led nearly eight seconds off the 200-yard freestyle pool record. The new time is 2:01.5. Teammate Dave Smith held the old record of 2:04.4.

The Maple 200-yard freestyle relay team of Bechtel, Bill Buick, Tony Palmer and Bob Sirtz lowered the pool standard in that event from 1:42.1 to 1:39.8. Buick, Palmer, E. J. McGinnis and Lee Har-

The committee chairman is Rep. Thomas J. Whinery, first district, Kent county.

As stated by the NRA, the inclusion of the proposal is presumably good. Its weaknesses, however, heavily outweigh this fact.
