### Council Studies Police Problem At Woodcreek

WOODCREEK FARMS—Woodcreek has until July 1 to establish police protection of its own. Farmington Township Supervisor Frank Stephenson confirmed that township police would make two nightly circuits of the area until then.

Councilman Zar Reader told the council Jan. 7 that Stephenson recommended a paid police force for the Woodcreek area rather than volunteers, if village finances permit.

Robert Weaver, citizen assigned to discuss Woodcreek's protection problem with Oakland County Sheriff Frank Innes, reported that it would cost about \$5,200 a year for the sheriff's department to add a man to specially patrol Woodcreek.

WEAVER ALSO quoted from a being opposed to volunteers, although he cited Franklin village's volunteers as better than most.

Volunteers, Weaver continued, should be uniformed, bonded, insured and carefully selected.

Councilman Harry Lang suggested a "watch dog" patrol consisting of a radio car and private citizens to take turns patrolling Woodcreek's roads at night. The patrol, Lang said, would serve only to alert township, county or state police of suspicious actions. Lang estimated this program would cost the village about \$1,200 a year.

The Woodcreek council agreed further study was necessary before action could be taken. The board must decide before budget meeting in March.

### Fire Radio, Machine For Billing Okayed

BLOOMFIELD—The Bloomfield township board Monday voted to spend \$5,000 on a billing machine and \$200 for a radio for its fire truck.

Homeer Case, township treasurer, said the billing machine would save the township's hiring another person to work in the water, sewer and tax departments.

Case said the radio from the old fire truck could not be converted to serve the new one because of a difference in voltage. The township has been hampered in using the new truck because of this lack, he said.
