ISSUE OF DECEMBER 5

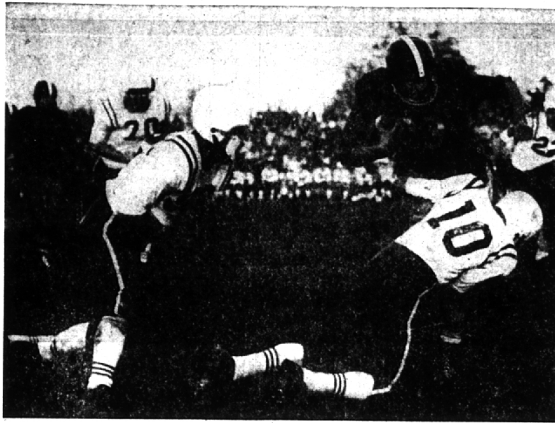
Two rulings by the state supreme court have upheld a refusal by Bloomfield Hills to rezone property on Woodward avenue from residential to commercial.

The Bloomfield Hills city commission, in response to a state highway department request, increased the speed limit on Woodward avenue through the city from 45 to 50 miles an hour. The move is part of a plan to improve traffic flow from Detroit to Pontiac.

Paul Risner, 39, implicated in a \$5,000 home looting in Bloomfield Hills June 25 as well as several other area home robberies, was arrested by Chicago police. He has a long police record. Quick action by a high school youth and two companions was credited with saving the lives of three girls who fell through thin ice on Gillers lake while skating. Linda McCombs, 12, Quanton road; Jane Durham, 15, Snowshoe circle; and Susan Courson, 12, Carriage road, plunged into the icy water when ice near the center of the lake gave way. They were rescued by 16-year-old Dale Moncrief, Cottontail lane, and his companions, Logan Richards, Jr., and Steve Jackel. Moncrief suffered severe facial cuts when he fell while rushing to the rescue.

The Westwood Village charter commission signed the charter for the future city and sent it to Gov. Williams for approval. Residents of the area will vote Feb. 3 on the proposed charter.

ISSUE OF DECEMBER 19

Thirty-six acres of property on Lahser road near Westchester village have been purchased as a site for two Catholic high schools—one for boys and another for girls—to be built soon. Tentative plans call for the school to serve six area parishes—Holy Name, Our Lady Queen of Martyrs and St. Columban's of Birmingham; St. Bede's of Lathrup; St. Hugo of the Hills, Bloomfield Hills, and Clawson Guardian Angel.

Some 200 Troy citizens turned out Monday night for a public hearing at which the southeastern Oakland county garbage and rubbish authority presented its case for a landfill site in the city. The hearing failed to reach a solution in the feud between the city and the authority.

A \$606,000 storm sewer bond issue and the controversial downspout disconnection ordinance will be the major items on the ballot when Lathrup residents vote in a special election Feb. 18.
