Palate Humps
Feeble-Minded Children
Grey Hair

Q. Do feeble-minded children ever improve?
A. Some do. Certain conditions lead to mental dullness. Correct the disorder and the mind improves. In some cases, change in environment helps. A group of 50 mentally defective children were given I.Q. (mental) tests by English doctors. The youngsters were examined two years later and almost half the group had increased their I.Q. by 8 to as much as 25 points. Best improvement occurred in those who had been raised in the poorest environments and who were later given more advantages. There are no known substances that can be taken to raise the mental capacity of feeble-minded people who are born with parts of the brain missing or have conditions which prevent the mind from developing beyond a certain point. Doctors have no way of helping them because there is so little with which to work.

Q. Does cancer ever start from a lump in the roof of the mouth?
A. It might, but two Ohio University surgeons say that most long lumps in the center of the palate are quite harmless, of all doctors. Unless the growth causes pain and treatment of disease is the Ohio doctors' best advice is to wait until a physician can palpate lumps usually can be felt by personally attending the trouble if it is back to let your patient.
