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Grace Church Redeemer Lutheran Buys Building Club Plans Dinner On Lincoln

Two important moves were announced this week by Grace Baptist church, Birmingham.

First is the purchase of the structure at Lincoln and Edgewood in which the newly formed congregation has been holding services for the past few months.

Second announcement is the leasing of a parsonage at 284 W. Brown street at Lakeside, to which the Rev. and Mrs. Charles Whitfield moved this week from Pontiac.

MR. WHITFIELD SAID the church and 150-square foot lot was purchased from its former owners, the Church of the Nazarene, for \$45,000. The Nazarene church, he said, had consolidated with a Nazarene congregation in Berkeley.

The local church's month-long campaign to raise funds for the purchase has already netted over \$10,000, Mr. Whitfield said.
