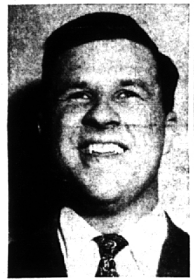
Lew Evans, public relations director of American Air Lines will speak on "Women's Role in Aviation."

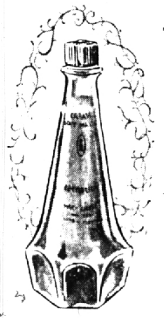

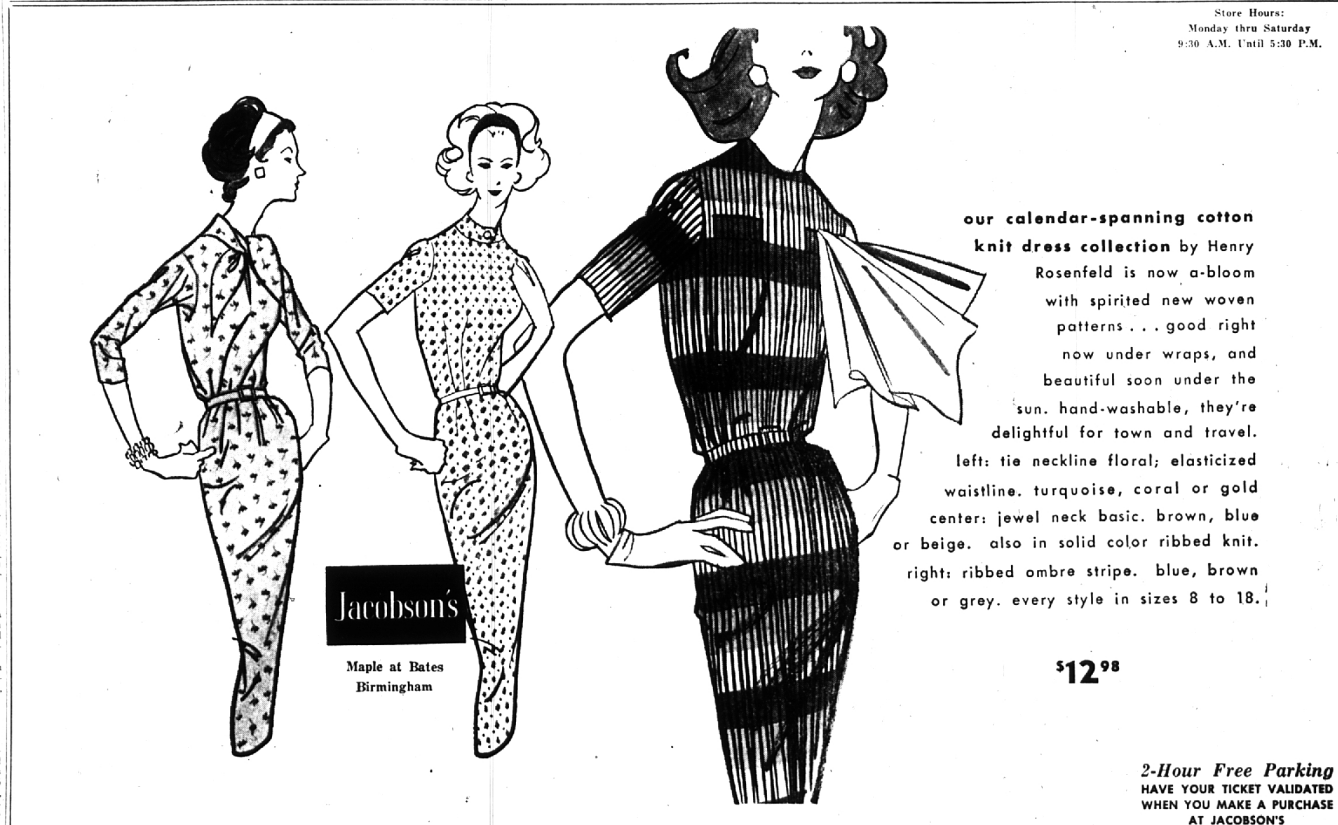
