



Rev. Stout Hasn't Had A Minute To Spare

The longer you talk to the tall, blond minister with the black-rimmed spectacles who just came to Embury Methodist church, the more amazed you are.

For you realize that anyone who has accomplished so much by age 36 must be a very hard-working, dedicated person. Not that the Rev. Samuel F. Stout would ever brag about his accomplishments. These things only come out when you really quiz him, like he did this week in an interview at the parsonage at 1720 Bradford.

IN THE attractive two-story farm colonial home where he and his pretty wife are settling, he gradually learned that he has just completed three years of study at Oberlin college in Cleveland in preparation for becoming a Methodist minister. That while he was studying, he was also minister of Christian education at the big Epworth-Euclid Methodist church in Cleveland.

That while he was minister of Christian education at the church near Western Reserve university, this wife was director of Christian education there.

That he earned his master's degree by going to night school at Wayne state university for two years. And that during this time he spent his daytimes as associate minister of Highland Park, Methodist church in Detroit.

He got his master's degree in guidance and counseling, writing his final thesis on the counseling services offered to adolescents by Protestant churches.

"My interest always seemed to gravitate toward youth," he says. "When he wasn't busy being a minister and going to school at the same time, he spent three years for soldiering for freedom in two European combat during World War II."

AFTER THAT he began training for his ministerial duties. He attended the fifth quadrennial meeting of the national council of women's organizations of the Presbyterian church in the USA, which last month merged with the United Presbyterian church of North America to form the three million member United Presbyterian church in the USA.

The meeting was held at Purdue university, West Lafayette, Ind. Highlights of the session was adoption of a "Charter for Christian Action" drawn up after recommendations from more than 3000 local church study groups.

The charter will guide the Presbyterian church at home and abroad of Presbyterian women's organizations.

OTHER delegates to the convention included colorfully gowned women from churches over the world, including Egypt, Cuba, Brazil, Indonesia, and West Africa. Miss Patricia Sutherland of India, who became acquainted with many members of First Presbyterian church when she received training in Michigan for her Christian work in India, also attended.

Flown back to America to participate in the session, Miss Sutherland drove from Birmingham to the Indiana campus with Mrs. Woodfend. Miss Sutherland heads women's work for the United Church of North India.

ing to be a Christian Missionary Alliance minister. And about here is where Margaret Dickinson comes in. Mr. Stout, a Royal Oaker, had been introduced to the fair-complexioned Birmingham high school graduate (class of '42) by his sister, Margaret, the daughter of the George C. Dickinsons, now of Royal Oak, was living in Birmingham then.

In 1946 the pair were married. They settled down in Niagara, N. Y., and both became students at the C.M.A. Bible college there. While her husband studied for the ministry, Mrs. Stout studied to be a minister of Christian education.

TRUE TO the busy pattern of his life while he received his first ministerial church, it was not to one church, but three. In three counties near Grand Rapids, he traveled from country church to country church every Sunday morning, preaching at 9, 10 and 11:15 a.m. each week for three years.

His probably talks more, but I didn't find out. Got so exhausted just hearing about this much of his life I had to excuse myself and leave.

B'ham Witnesses To Attend Convo

Jehovah's Witnesses from the Birmingham congregation have announced plans to attend an international convention of Jehovah's Witnesses in New York city this summer.

Kenneth Pulcifer, presiding minister of the local group, said the convention could well be the largest in the history of Jehovah's Witnesses. It is scheduled for July 27 through August 1 and will be held in Yankee stadium and the polo grounds simultaneously.

The last international convention, attended by many Birmingham Witnesses, was held in 1953 in Yankee stadium and reached a peak attendance of 165,000 in the overflow audiences. Watchtower publications have arranged this year for most program features to be repeated at the Polo Grounds following the first presentation in Yankee stadium.

Nativity Church Sets New Hour, Greets Vicar

A new summer schedule adopted to begin this Sunday at Nativity Episcopal church, 14 Mile at Forest lane, sets the time of services at 10 a.m. Both church school and confirmation classes will meet at that hour, instead of 11:15 a.m. as formerly, through Aug. 31.
