Cranbrook Gardens Setting For Outdoor Concert Series

Area concert goers can look forward to hearing good music with an outdoor setting as the Cranbrook Garden Concerts open for the second season July 13th.

The Garden concerts were originated by the Cranbrook Music Guild with the idea of a "Tangle-wood-type" concert series where the public could enjoy the best of chamber music outdoors. The concerts have a perfect setting on the beautiful Cranbrook House grounds in Bloomfield Hills. Concert goers bring their own blankets and cushions and sit in the terraced gardens overlooking Kingswood lake.

THIS YEAR the series under the chairmanship of Clyde P. Craine, Jr., has been lengthened to four concerts and the number of featured artists greatly enlarged.

The concerts will take place each Sunday afternoon at 4:30 p.m. July 13, 20, 27 and August 3. The program will again be under the direction of Paul Olefsky, principal cellist of the Detroit Symphony, and will feature Symphony members and a large group of soloists.

Participating artists include Marilyn Colloff, soprano; Jaana Freeman, Ruth Meckler, William Dopman and Theodore Letzvin, pianists; Shirley Mathews, harpist; and Dorak's Trio "Danky" with Olefsky, Staples and Freeman. Miss Colloff will be featured in a group of cantata airs by Scarlatti accompanied by Miss Mathews on the harpsichord.

THE FIRST concert will consist of a Handel Sonata with Staples and Freeman; Barber's Sonata Opus 2 with Olefsky and Freeman; and Dvorak's Trio "Danky" with Olefsky, Staples and Freeman. Miss Colloff will be featured in a group of cantata airs by Scarlatti accompanied by Miss Mathews on the harpsichord.
