SOUTHFIELD—Settlement appraisals of real estate owned by the old Southfield township show a value of \$69,950 within the new city, and \$28,000 for the 13 Mile road fire hall.

The figures were submitted to the Southfield township board Tuesday by Elmer W. Haack, appraiser for the city and township.

The four pieces of property in the city of Southfield evaluated were the fire station at 9 Mile road, \$37,800; the fire station at 10 Mile road, \$10,000; the fire site at 12 Mile road, \$2,000; and the office, garage and pump house on Borg road at \$30,150.

In other action the township board agreed to meet on the second Tuesday of each month beginning in August, instead of the second and fourth Tuesdays.
